Page 2:1 - James BYRNE while working at Dunlop's Brewery in this Village on the 19th inst. was suffocated by inhaling carbonic acid gas. He was at work at his usual avocation, and he had been often cautioned against the danger of inhaling the gas. He was taking the cover from off the beer vat, and in so doing he dropped a nut from one of the bolts, and in attempting to get it out, lost his life. Coroner W. held an inquest and a verdict was returned in accordance with the above facts.

- An inquest was held on the 13th inst. on the body of Richard CHAMBERS, who was discovered lying sick beside the road on the east side of the Canal, in the lower part of this Village, and died before being moved or relieved of his illness. The Coroner's jury returned a verdict of death by intemperance and exposure.
- MURDERER ARRESTED A man named Manly RANSOM was arrested in Northampton on Saturday night last, for the murder of his wife in Spencer in July 1850.....(article goes on as to the details of the crime).

Page 2:4 - Sherburne, Mass. Sept 14 - HORRIBLE MURDER - Last night Reuben COUSINS, are spectable farmer, age 70 years and his wife were murdered in their dwelling by a man named John CHAPMAN. He first called COUSINS to the door and murdered him with an axe and then killed Mrs. COUSINS and attempted the life of a laborer who was in his bed and then fled. COUSINS was reported to have a large amount of money in his house. The whole Village are now searching for CHAPMAN in the woods.

Boston - September 16 - The murderer of Mr. COZZENS and wife at Sherburne was arrested last night in a ravine about a mile from the scene of the murder. He has partially confessed.

Page 2:4 - SUPPOSED MURDER - At an early hour last evening as Messrs. Wm. H. WINNE and W.T. ARMS were returning to the City, by the Albany Road, they discovered the body of a man lying near the Road, about a mile below the gate. Upon examining him, his throat was discovered with afrightful gash across it, which had completely severed the jugular vein. Two deep stabs were also found in the left breast, either of which would have produced death. They immediately gave the alarm, and a number of residents in that vicinity came to the spot. The body was recognized as that of Charles SNYDEL, a German. The greatest excitement existed in the neighborhood, as the condition of the body when found, and the frightful
