Page 2:5 - MARRIED - In Waterford June 1st by Rev. E. LUCUS, Mr. James D. RETALICK of this Village to Mrs. Ann WETS of Waterford.

JUNE 14, 1854

Page 2:3 - MURDER TRIAL FIRE - Utica June 12 - The trial of Duane S. SIMMONS, indicted for the murder of Bernard McMANUS in this city, on the 31st of January 1853, commenced here today. SIMMONS was a watchman, and as he alleges shot McMANUS in the discharge of his official duties.

Page 2:4 - Capt. Samuel DILL, a native of Chatham, Mass. & Captain of the Packet Ship Bay State died at Baltimore on Thursday morning of small pox.

Page 2:5 - DEATH OF CHARLES C. WRIGHT - Charles C. WRIGHT the eminent artist, who has acquired a world wide celebrity in the execution of the gold medals ordered by Congress for Generals TAYLOR & SCOTT, and the celebrated medal of Henry CLAY, died at his residence, in New York, on the 7th inst., at 53 years of age. He was the first person who established the xylographic mode of printing in New York City, and also introduced the first machinery for the manufacture of steel pens in the United States. He recently completed a medal of the Declaration of Independence, with a beautiful head of WASHINGTON on the reverse, which is another specimen of his skill by which he will be remembered.

Page 3:1 - DIED - In this Village on the 8th inst. of consumption, Mrs. Caroline COLE, wife of John COLE, age 41 years 9 months.

Page 2:2 - DR. Amatus ROBBINS, one of the oldest practicing physicians in Troy, expired at his residence in that city, on Thursday afternoon last.

Page 2:5 - DEATH OF JUDGE MERRICK - Washington, June 20 - Judge MERRICK, a brother of the ex-Senator, died in this City yesterday.

Page 2:1 - Coroner WITBECK held an inquest on the 21st inst. on the body of Geo. DOCKSTEELE, Captain of the scow boat Cataract, who accidentally fell into the Erie Canal, at the foot of Lock No. 10. A verdict was returned in accordance with the above facts.
