Page 2:3 - DEATH OF REV. T. F. WYCKOFF - It is with feelings of regret that we are obliged to announce the death of Rev. Theodore F. WYCKOFF, recently Pastor of the South Reform Dutch Church in this Village. Mr. W. was a man of fine talents. During his residence in this vicinity, he had won the esteem and friendship not only of his own flock, but of the greater portions of our citizens generally. Many are the hearts made sad by his unexpected demise.

Page 3:1 - DIED - On the Island of St. Thomas on the 18th ult, Rev. Theodore F. WYCKOFF, formerly of this Village, in the 35th year of his age.

MARCH 7, 1855

Page 2:3 - A MAN KILLED ON THE RAILROAD - An accident occurred on the Turnpike Crossing on the Albany Northern Railroad on Monday morning, by which a man named A. TOLE, a resident of Cohoes, was instantly killed. TOLE was standing on the track with his back towards the approaching train which was coming south, looking at a team which had just been backed off the track, when the accident occurred, the engine striking him with such power as to throw him entirely off the track, and producing instant death. Coroner WITBECK summoned a jury and held an inquest upon the body of the deceased, the jury returning a verdict in accordance with the above facts and also recommending the Company to station a flagman at this public Crossing.

Page 3:1 - DIED - In Jersey City on Sunday the 4th inst., Ella, daughter of Richard & Emily MORRELL, age 3 years & 3 mos.

MARCH 21, 1855

Page 2:3 - The body of Emma MOORE was found at Rochester Monday afternoon under the ice in the mill-race by a boy who was getting water from a hole. The body has been identified by the ear jewels and bonnet.

Page 3:2 - DIED - In this Village on Wednesday evening March 14th William Andrews, son of Robert & Jane Ann ROBINSON, age 13 months & 6 days.

MARCH 28, 1855

Page 2:2 - Mr. T.B. HAMILTON of New York was on Friday arrested for cow-hiding Mr. J. J. CHAMBERS, Private Secretary to Gov. CLARK. This is the same gentleman who pulled the Private Secretary's nose, some time since.
