was drowned on Thursday afternoon under the following circumstances. He was in bathing off Fish Island with three companions as were likewise several smaller boys. PERKINS discovered that two of the smaller boys were struggling in the water, and immediately put out to rescue them, and it was in this act of true heroism that the young man lost his own life. A ferryman in one of Morrison's skiffs likewise discovered the perilous position of the two small boys, and hastened with the skiff to their assistance in which they were taken up. The ferryman did not suppose PERKINS to be drowning, as he gave no alarm and therefore no assistance was rendered. The body of PERKINS was not recovered til Saturday when it was found at the fishing groundon the dyke leading to Patroon Island. An inquest was held by Coroner WITBECK of this Village the jury rendering a verdict of accidental drowning.

JULY 18, 1855

Page 2:3 - A young man named Barney SULLIVAN, aged about 19 years, was stepped upon by a horse in a barn attached to Smith & Learned's lumber yard on Tuesday the 10th inst, rupturing his bowels and causing death on the 12th. Drs. VIELE & BURRUS held a post-mortem examination on the body of the deceased; an inquest was held and a verdict rendered in accordance with the above facts.

- Edward GRISWOLD was drowned on Wednesday afternoon last by falling into Lock No. 17, Erie Canal. He was engaged in tending the Lock, and accidentally stepped off the running board and was carried through the wicket of the lower gate to a hole about 200 feet below, where his body was found after the water on the level between Lock 16 & 17 had been drawn off. An inquest was held by Coroner WITBECK of this Village and a verdict rendered of accidental drowning.

Page 2:5 - Mrs. Catherine SHOLEY, the fat woman of Ohio, being the largest woman in the world died in Sciota, OHIO on the 5th inst. while setting in her chair. She had a life insurance of \$25,000.
