

APRIL 9, 1856

Page 2:4 - FATAL ACCIDENT - A gentlemen Mr. A. BOULTON of Sandusky, Ohio, while laboring under halucination of mind, brought on by fever, on Friday morning threw himself from a third story window in the Delevan House, Albany, upon the pavement in Montgomery Street. No bones were broken but he received a severe wound upon his head causing him great loss of blood. He died from the effects of the injuries that afternoon about 2 o'clock.

Page 2:5 - DIED - In this Village on Thursday 3d inst. Mrs. Harriet SMITH, age 35.

APRIL 23, 1856

Page 3:1 - MARRIED - On the 23d ult by the Rev. Dr. GREGORY, Mr. John R. SMITH to Miss Emily A. WOOD, both of this Village.

- By the same on the 15th inst. Mr. Egbert H. DYER to Miss Augusta BARTLETT, both of this Village.

APRIL 30, 1856

Page 2:2 - FATAL ACCIDENT - On Friday night last about 8 o'clock, as William ERWIN was crossing the plank from the east side of the Canal to the boat lying in the Canal near Ferry St. in this Village, he stumbled and fell headlong against the boat fracturing his skull very badly. He was shortly afterwards picked up and conveyed to his residence on Temperance Hill, where he died Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock. A post-mortem examination was held by Dr. BURRUS, when it was ascertained that his death<sup>was</sup> caused by compression of the brain brought about by his fall. Coroner WANDS, of Cohoes, summoned a jury to hold an inquest and the verdict in accordance with the facts above stated was rendered. The deceased was about 30 years of age and leaves a wife and one child.

MAY 7, 1856

Page 2:1 - Ogden HOFFMAN, late Attorney General of our State died very suddenly at his residence in New York at 2 o'clock on Thursday afternoon last. His disease was congestion of the lungs.....article goes on about his life etc.

Page 2:3 - Michael SPENCER, a colored person, aged about 80 years, and who has for 25 years past, resided at the Boght, in the Town of Watervliet, died about 1 o'clock Friday morning last at the Planing Mill near the upper Ferry, where the watchman had taken him in for shelter. There were no marks of violence on his person. Dr. J.P. WITBECK held a post-mortem examination, which revealed the fact that he had by some means ruptured a blood vessel in his head, producing compression & congestion, which undoubtedly caused his death.
