MAY 14, 1856

Page 2:2 - The name of the colored man, hand on board the Steamer G.C. DAVIDSON, whose death by drowning was announced last week was Peter JACKSON. The Lansingburgh papers state that he bore an excellent character, and was very much respected.

Page 2:4 - Mrs. Jerusha PALMER, for many years publisher of the Mt. Holly New Jersey Mirror and mother of B.B. PALMER of Philadelphia died in Mt. Holly on Saturday night. She was 90 years of age and was with one exception, the oldest resident of Mt. Holly.

Page 2:5 - Mr. Wm. CASSIDY, well-known as the Editor of the Albany Atlas, was on Thursday in New York united in marriage, to Miss Lucy ROCHEFORTE, daughter of R. ROCHEFORTE, Esq. of that City. At the conclusion of the ceremony -the usual congratulations of the friends being omitted, the bridal part immediately left the Church and were to set off the same day enroute for Washington & Richmond, to be absent until the 25th inst.

Page 2:5 - MARRIED - In this Village on Thursday the 22d inst., by Rev. G.L. ROOF, Mr. Isaac TYLER & Miss Henrietta V.F. VANDEMARK, both of this place.

JUNE 4, 1856

Page 2:2 - Drowned on Thursday morning last - The body of Mary DESMEL was found in the State Basin in the upper part of this Village. It appeared upon the inquest that she had left her home on Green Island Monday previous, to go to Cohoes to get the keys of her trunk which she had left in a house in that Village from which she had lately moved; also that she was seen in Cohoes on that day. No marks of violence
