His candor and sound judgement were remarkable, while truth and integrity were his prominent characteristics. A man of literary taste and acquirements, he was retired in his habits. Mr. P. was an unmarried man, but he possessed a warm and affectionate heart, and delighted in attributing to the happiness and success in life of his acquaintances. He only required to be known to be respected and admired. He has left us though gone an example and lasting influence.

Page - John S.C. GOODRICH, Editor of the Greenbush Guardian died at the residence of his father in that Village Wed. morning last. His funeral took place on Thursday afternoon and was attended by Masonic ceremonies.

Page 2:6 - DIED - In this Village, on Sunday morning, Sept. 27th, Rensselaer PHELPS, age 39 years. His remains were conveyed to the Town of Schroon, Essex Co. for interment.

Page 2:3 - THE OLDEST CITIZEN - William STEVENS of the Town of Knox died on the 24th ult in the 102d year of his age. He was perhaps the oldest citizen in Albany County. Mr. STEVENS was born in England on the 1 day of April 1756 and came to this country in 1775. Both he and his father took part in the War of the Revolution. He lived in the Town of Knox from 1780 til his death a period of 77 years.

OCTOBER 14, 1857

Page 2:1 - We are pained to learn by a dispatch from Portland that Hon. William P. FESSENDEN who had ably represented Maine in the United States Senate for three years past, died in that City on Saturday evening after an illness of only three days.

Page 2:2 - WIFE MURDER IN TROY - A Mrs. Eliza BLAKELY was brutally murdered in Troy on Friday night last, by her husband Chas. BLAKELY, a teamster in the employ of Calahan & Company,, coal dealers. The body showed that she had been beaten to death, and the Coroner's jury enpaneled to investigate the case, rendered a verdict to that effect. The murderer is yet at large.

- MELANCHOLY EVENT - Col. Col. Richard J. KNOWLSON a resident of Sand Lake, Rensselaer County, and formerly an extensive and wealthy businessman in Troy, came to his death early on Wednesday morning last, it is supposed, by committing suicide, by throwing himself before a train of cars. The Coroner's jury, however, after hearing all the testimony in the case, rendered a verdict that he came to his death by being run over by the Hudson River train of cars, and whether by accident or otherwise, to the jury unknown.
