He, in company with others, was engaged in getting it into the building at the time. He saw the stone was about to fall, and endeavered to get away, but slipped and fell underneath, and was crushed to death. Coroner WITBECK held an inquest on the body of the deceased.

Page 2:2 - FATAL ACCIDENT - A painful accident occurred Monday morning, between eight & nine o'clock, on the Northern Railroad, a short distance this side of Cohoes. A man named Thomas TANSY, who resided at Albany, and worked on a wood train, was thrown off one of the cars and his head severed from his body. It was supposed that while he was standing on top of one of the cars, the engine stopped suddenly, throwing him forward between two cars. He leaves a wife and three small children.

Page 2:2 - DEATH OF AN OLD PILOT? - Under our obituary head today is announced the death of John HASKELL, formerly of Albany, latterly of Watervliet Centre, in the 74th year of his age. Sometime since he broke his arm and had not yet recovered from the injury. On Thursday night he went into his garden, and while there, fell and broke his leg just above the ankle. He was carried to the house Whena physician arrived and proceeded to set the limb, he exclaimed, "Doctor I am going." and died almost immediately.
