Page 2:3 - KILLED BY THE CARS - A young man, 19 years of age, named James WILSON, was run over and instantly killed on the Troy & Greenbush Railroad about two miles above Bath, between 2 & 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon. He was walking on the track near a curve, and as soon as the Engineer saw him he sounded the alarm whistle. WILSON, being deaf, did not hear the whistle, before the train could be checked, it ran over him cutting him in two and causing instant death. No blame can be attached to the Engineer, as it was impossible for him to stop the train after he saw WILSON. The remains were picked up and carried to Troy where an inquest was held. WILSON was a resident of Greenbush.

Page 2:6 - DIED - In Sanford, Broome Co., NY, on the 20th ult, Eliza, wife of James C. PALMER in the 43d year of her age.

Page 2:2 - CORONER'S INQUEST - Coroner WITBECK held an inquest on Monday, on the body of John SWART, a hand on the Canal boat B.F. WILLARD, who was drowned in Lock 10, Erie Canal. The verdict returned a verdict of accidental drowning.

AUGUST 22, 1860

Page 2:1 - DEATH OF CONDUCTOR COOLEY - The many friends of G.S. COOLEY, in this vicinity will regret to learn that he died in Albany on Tuesday last. Mr. C. was a long-time Conductor on the Albany Northern Railroad, and by his obliging manners and gentlemanly deportment won the respect and esteem of all with whom he came in contact. It will be remembered that Mr. COOLEY was in the train on the Northern Railroad at the time of the sad catastrophe at Schaghticoke last summer. He fell into the River with the wreck of the Bridge and train having his child in his arms. The child was killed, as was also Mrs. COOLEY and her mother Mrs. CUYLER. Mr. COOLEY never recovered from the injuries received on that occasion, and for weeks his health has been such that his death might have been hourly expected. His funeral took place on Thursday last.

Page 2:2 - DAVID BUEL jr, one of the oldest and most esteemed citizens of Troy died at his residence in that City on Thursday evening last.

Page 2:2 - SAD ACCIDENT - A sad accident occurred in Albany, Monday, at 6 o'clock, P.M. A hickory pole, 8 feet high, which was to be raised that night, with the celebration by the Little Giant's Club in the 3rd Ward, fell through the breaking of a rope, instantly killing one child named LEHMAN
