Page 2:6 - DIED - In this Village on Saturday 11th inst. Mr. Lucius B. GARRET.

MAY 22, 1861

Page 2:2 - Mrs. Sarah HOWE, of Worcester, 64 years of age, daughter of Capt. Peter SLATER, who was one of the party engaged in throwing overboard the tea in Boston Harbor, and who served in the Patriot Army during the Revolutionary War, has manufactured with her own hands, and from material grown on South Carolina soil, an efficient anecdote for treason - a finely wrought and substantial hangman's rope, with noose properly adjusted for use. The old lady forwarded the article to Gov. ANDREWS on Saturday with the expressed desire that it be used to stretching the necks of the two greatest traitors against the Republic to be found in the Country.

Page 2:3 - INQUEST - Coroner WITBECK held an inquest on Thursday morning last upon the body of a German rag-picker named John BROWN, found floating in the Canal near the weigh-lock. BROWN resided at Crescent, Saratoga Co. The jury rendered a verdict of accidental drowning.

MAY 29, 1861

Page 2:3 - INQUEST - Coroner WITBECK held an inquest on the afternoon of the 21st inst upon the body of Henry SWEENEY, which was found in the Canal at the lower side-cut. SWEENEY was a member of the Whitehall Company of Volunteers attached to Col. PHELPS Regiment, and had been missing from camp for several days. The jury rendered a verdict of accidental drowning.

- RELIC - We understand that Hiram GREENMAN has at his hotel on the Albany Road just below this Village, a large powder horn, a relic of Revolutionary times, on the surface of which is sketched with a pointed instrument a view of the City of New York and surroundings as it appeared in the Year 1778. The horn was originally the property of Garret NEWKIRK, who was a soldier in the War of the Revolution, and is inscribed with his name and the date 1778. It has remained in the possession of the descendants of the original owner, and is now the property of a Mr. NEWKIRK residing in the lower part of the Village

- FATAL ACCIDENT - A German girl about 16 years of age, named Margaret SCRIN, employed as a domestic in the family of Alfred MOSHER, on River St., met with an accident resulting in her death on Saturday last. It appears that while at work about the stove, preparing breakfast the skirt of her dress caught fire. Being considerably frightened, instead of endeavoring to tear off her clothes, she rushed into the yard. Her motion of course served to fan the flames. Rushing back into the house, she was met at the top of a flight of stairs by Mrs. M. who
