

OCTOBER 13, 1841

Page 2:4 - TWO MEN KILLED & SIX WOUNDED - Fatal accident on board the steam frigate - Yesterday afternoon a 64 pound gun burst on board the steamer while off the Hook, killing two persons instantly and wounding six others very badly. The names of the killed are Samuel SNOWMAN, seaman & Joseph PHILBROOK, ordinary seaman. The wounded are Russell SMITH, carpenter's mate; Joshua WYMAN, quarter gunner; Levi LAWSON, Thomas SMITH, Richard BELL & John COOPER, seamen, all badly (article goes on discussing the accident).

Page 2:5 - Daniel C. PAYNE, the affianced lover of the late Mary C. ROGERS, was found dead on Friday evening last at Hoboken on the spot where the lifeless body of Miss ROGERS was discovered. It is said he was the victim of feelings caused by her melancholy death.

Page 2:5 - MARRIED - In Troy on the 14th inst., by Rev. Mr. BEAMAN, Mr. James L. BALDWIN of West Troy to Miss Lucretia B. MONTAGUE of the former city.

- DIED - At Newark on the 6th inst., James E. CONGER, formerly of this Village, son of the late Stephen M. CONGER Esq. of Newark, NJ, age 24 years.

At Ballston Center on the morning of the 13th inst., in the 21st year of his age, Edward Henry, son of E.C. DELEVAN.

In this Village 3d inst. James H. CADMUS, in the 26th year of his age.

Page 2:5 - MORE LAST MEN - The death of a Revolutionary Soldier was announced a few days since as last survivor of the Battle of Bunker Hill. Since then, however, several others have been announced as yet living, ex gr: There are now living in the Town of Ipswich, Essex Co., Mass. Abraham PERKINS, John H. BOARDMAN, JEREMIAH ROSS, Samuel LANKASTER, all of whom were in the Battle of Bunker Hill. In the same town are now living 18 Soldiers of the Revolutionary War. There was a curious fact connected with the Bunker Hill survivors, elicited at the laying of the cornerstone of the Bunker Hill Monument by Lafayette, in the Year 1825 being the 50th anniversary of the battle. The Committee of Arrangements advertised for all the survivors of the battle to assemble on the occasion for whose entertainment provisions were made. Well: the day came and upon counting up the survivors, they were found to outnumber those originally engaged in battle. - Comm. Advertiser
