Page 2:2 - HORRIBLE ACCIDENT - A ~~LITTLE~~ CHILD BURNED TO DEATH - One of the most horrible accidents we have been called upon to record, occurred about half past 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It appears that Mrs. Mary Ann CULHANE, who resides in a basement of a wooden dwelling on the east side of Ohio St., a short distance north of the Baptist Church, left her little child, a girl of about three years of age, asleep in the bedroom adjoining the main room, and went out of the house, intending to return in a short time. A few moments after, a colored woman residing in the upper part of the building, discovered smoke issuing from the basement and gave an alarm of fire. Several men who responded to the call, burst in the basement door, when a horrid sight presented itself - but a little ways from the door lay the child on the floor, its clothes entirely burned off and its body almost a crisp. The bed clothes were also on fire and the flames were about communicating to the dwelling. These were extinguished however, with a few buckets of water. It is supposed that the child must have awoke just after her mothers leaving the house and must have dragged some of the bed clothes from the bedroom out near the stove, and either they or her clothes first taken fire. From the position of the child when found, it would seem that she had endeavored to escape from the building while she was on fire, but the door being locked it was impossible for her to.

Page 2:3 - A WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH - Coroner WITBECK held an inquest on Wednesday evening last upon the body of Margaret CONDON, a young woman about 25 years of age, who resided in Cohoes and who died from the effects of burns received the morning of that day. The circumstances of the case are as follows: - She boarded with Mrs. WATERS in Van Rensselaer Block, corner of Seneca & Remsen Streets, and as Mrs. W. was absent from home, Miss C. attempted to build a fire in the stove between 5 & 6 o'clock. She placed a fluid lamp on a chair in back of her, and in reaching over,
