

APRIL 2, 1862

Page 2:3 - Michael JOYCE, at work on a railroad bank, at Kenwood, Albany County, was killed on Saturday, by a slide. His body was not bruised. He must therefore have died from suffocation.

Page 2:6 - DIED - In this Village March 25 1862, Kate daughter of J.H. & Catherine RHODES, age 2 yrs & 6 mos.

APRIL 9, 1862

Page 2:5 - BODY FOUND - On Sunday last some fishermen at Cohoes, brought up in a net the body of a lad, which proved to be that of Charles B. HAY, who was drowned at the Mohawk St. crossing in that Village, last October. Coroner WITBECK was notified and held an inquest.

APRIL 16, 1862

Page 2:5 - DEATH OF MR. HALSTED - The death of Mr. HALSTED, a member of the Assembly, was announced in that body Wednesday afternoon, by Mr. TALLMAN. Eloquent and appropriate tributes were paid the deceased by Messrs. TALLMAN, DEPEW, RAYMOND, STETSON, SCHOLEFIELD and others. Mr. HALSTED died suddenly of apoplexy. He was a man much esteemed by all who made his acquaintance.

Page 2:6 - DIED - In this Village on Thursday April 10th Caroline H., widow of the late Enoch BURROWS, age 73 years, 10 months & 26 days.

- In this Village on the 15th day of April inst. Mary, wife of Arthur KENNY Esq. in the 28th year of her age. Funeral from her late residence Thursday the 17th at 2 o'clock P.M.

- At Van Vranken's Corners Monday April 14th, Nicholas VAN VRANKEN, age 30 years & 2 months. Funeral (Wed.) afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Baptist Church Newtonville.

APRIL 23, 1862

Page 2:3 - A woman named Catherine NICHOLSON residing on Washington St., Troy, was burned to death Monday night her clothes taking fire from a candle.

Page 2:4 - DEATH OF A YOUNG SOLDIER - We regret to be obliged to announce the death of Albert A. HILL, formerly a resident of this Village, and which occurred at Newbern, N.C. a few days since. He was at that time in the service of his country - having last summer joined the 21st Reg't. of Mass. Volunteers, at Springfield at which place he was then residing. This Regiment has seen active service, and the young soldier had been through two battles Roanoke & Newbern - in both of which, as it is stated by his commanding officer Capt. Chas. F. WOOLCOTT, he evinced considerable bravery. He was taken sick of typhoid fever, and after an illness of about ten days, he died at 4 o'clock on the morning of Sunday the 13th inst. The sad news of his death reached his mother at this village but a few hours
