Page 2:6 - Mrs. Mary Ann SINGER has obtained a divorce from her husband Isaac M., of sewing machine notoriety, with an alimony of \$8000 a year.

Page 2:3 - FATAL ACCIDENT - A terrible accident occurred in the knitting mill L.S. & J.H. PARSONS, Cohoes at about 10 o'clock A.M. Wednesday by which a young man by the name of James DONLON, was so seriously injured that he died the next afternoon. He was attending a picker, and hearing some hard substance going through, put in his hand to stop it. His fingers and hand were immediately caught by the crooked teeth of the machine, his arm drawn in and pulled completely from his body, leaving the lacerated nerves and shoulder blade exposed to view. A surgeon was immediately sent for, dressed his wounds, but the unfortunate man sank speedily, and died as above stated.

Page 2:4 - FATAL ACCIDENTThe true stated facts are thus: Edward BROWN who has formerly been a Canal boatman, and who spent the last winter in this Village, hired out to C.C. DUNCAN as hostler in the Canal stable. While at work on Thursday morning he was kicked the breast by a horse, and lived until 7 o'clock Friday morning. A post-mortem examination was held by Dr. SHILAND, from which it appears that the kick received had ruptured his stomach and thus caused death. The inquest being held the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the facts as stated. Coroner WITBECK placed the remains in the hands of an undertaker, by whom they were properly interred during the afternoon. The deceased was about 26 years of age and had no relatives in this section.

Page 2:6 - DIED - In this Village on Saturday May 3d, William HERBERT in the 41st year of his age.

Page 2:6 - KILLED AT THE BATTLE OF WILLIAMSBURGH - Among the heroes who fell fighting at the Battle of Williamsburgh on the 5th inst was James McCORMICK, a young man about 20 years of age, and son of Patrick McCORMICK, residing on Temperance Hill, in this Village. The young soldier was a member of Company K, Capt. T.C. MOORE - 6th Regiment, New Jersey Volunteers. He was shot through the head and expired instantly. The deceased was a brave soldier and greatly beloved by his comrades in arms.
