probably death of Corp. Emmet MCCLELLAND of the same Company in one of the hotly contested battles near Richmond. He was seen to fall, as, was supposed, mortally wounded, since which time nothing has been seen or heard of him or his remains. The Rebels now holding the ground upon which the battle was fought. Corp. M. was a young man about 23 years of age and the son of William N. McCLENNAN of this Village. (both McClelland & McClannan used)

Henry LOVELAND of the Village, also a member of Company B is reported to have received a flesh wound in the arm and Corp. Henry L. WITBECK of the West Troy Co. 34th Regt., is also mentioned as being slightly wounded in the same locality.

Charles CRAMER, who accompanied Col. MORRISON, has just returned from the encampment of the Army and reports having met Henry LOVELAND, just before starting, who confirmed the report of Corp. McCLENNAN's death, and also stated that Emmet COFFIN, Co. A, 10th Regt. was likewise among the killed. The lastnamed soldier was about 19 years of age, and prior to his enlistment he resided with his father Mr. William H. COFFIN in this Village.

Page 2:4 - BODY FOUND - The body of the lad Eddie HAINES, whose death by drowning we noticed last week, was found on Thursday morning last by fishermen near the bridge leading to Carpenter's Island.

Page 2:4 - Letters have been received within the last few days from members of the West Troy Company and the 34th Regt. which state that at the Battle of White Oaks Swamp which was fought on Monday 30th ult, Daniel CASSILY, a member of said company was killed. CASSILY was about 23 years of age and resided in Temperance Hill at the time of his enlistment. He was a good soldier and his loss is greatly deplored by his comrades.

Page 2:5 - NOT DEAD - It now appears that Lt. Charles G. OTIS of Troy of the 2nd Regiment was not killed as previously reported but is now a prisoner at Richmond. We are also pleased to learn that the report which reached her last week to the effect that Emmet COFFIN of Company A, 10th Regiment was among the killed in the battles before Richmond is incorrect. On Saturday last his parents received a letter from him written since the battle.

- DROWNED - On Wednesday evening last, William DYER a lad of about 12 years of age and son of Joseph DYER, was drowned while in bathing in the basin. The body was shortly after recovered and Coroner WITBECK held an inquest.
