Page 2:3 - CAPT. KING'S BODY RECOVERED - The Troy Whig announces that the body of Capt. Samuel KING, who was killed in the Battle of Manassas, has been recovered by his brother who went to Washington for that purpose. It is expected that the remains will arrive at Lansingburgh on Friday next. The body is to be embalmed in Washington. Captain FERGUSON who has recruited a Company for the new Regiment, in Lansingburgh, will, with his Company, escort the remains from this City to the former Village. The funeral obsequies will no doubt be large and imposing. It is stated that the effort to recover the remains of Lt. DARGEN of the same Company, has proved futile. The gentlemen engaged in the undertaking, however, expect to be successful in the end.

Assistant Paymaster, E.D. BARTON, of the Steamer HUNTSVILLE, died of yellow fever, on board ship, near Key West, on the 22d ult. Mr. B. was one of the most promising young men of Troy, and prior to his appointment in the Navy, he held the position of teller at the State Bank in that City.

Page 2:1 - SUICIDE - Mr. PRYNE, who was a member of the Legislature last winter, we learn committed suicide by cutting his throat with a razor at his residence in Williamson, Wayne Co. He had been deranged for some time.

Page 2:3 - The body of Capt. PERKINS, of the 2d Regiment, who was killed in the battle near Manassas, is expected to reach Troy tomorrow or next day and will be interred with suitable honors.

KILLEED - Capt. John KELLY, a well-known Trojan and Commandant of one of the companies in the 104th Reg't was killed in one of the recent battles in Maryland. Relatives are now in search of his body.

The remains of Lt. Frank DARGAN, of Lansingburgh, are known to have been placed in the vicinity of Centerville near Washington but the most diligent search and enquirey has not yet unraveled the mystery of the whereabouts. The friends and neighbors of the deceased, however, have hopes that the effort to recover the body will yet be successful.
