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James H. NORTHRUP, Joseph P. NORTHRUP, brothers; Lyman LYONS, John LYONS, brothers; and Timothy McCARTHY. John LYONS and TITUS, the colored man, were the only ones saved. The bodies of the others were soon recovered and placed in a house nearby, where they lay until Coroner WITBECK held an inquest. Verdict - accidental drowning. The whole party came to Albany on Saturday from the Village of Berne, Albany County where they resided. One of the drown McCARTHY & John LYONS belonged to the 61st Regiment N.Y.V.

Page 2:5 - Gen. GARLAND, one of the Rebel officers killed in Maryland, was the father-in-law of the notorious Major DEAS, who made a sudden transition from Troy to Louisiana, at the outbreak of the Rebellion.

Page 2:6 - DIED - In the hospital at Camp Dodge near Suffolk, VA of typhoid fever, George K. YEARSLEY, of this Village, (son of John D. YEARSLEY), age 19 years & one month. The deceased was a member of Col. DODGE's 1st Regiment Mounted Riflemen.

- In this Village at the residence of her brother-in-law R.J. URANN, on the 17th inst., Ann FONDA, age 28 years.

Page 2:3 - OUR WEST TROY SOLDIERS AT SHARPSBURGH - The killed and wounded - Among the Regiment which suffered severely at the Battle of Sharpsburgh were the 34th N.Y.V. to which is attached the West Troy Company, Capt. B.H. WARFORD. Touching the part taken in the Battle and the losses sustained by the Company we are permitted to extract the following particulars from the letter of a member of the same, written three days after the fight. "On the morning of the Battle, the reserve marched a mile or two, when they formed in line, and advanced over fences and through woods for another mile. When just at the edge of a piece of woods we engaged a Rebel force which had been lying there waiting for us; a Rebel column advanced to the left of us, flanking our left completely, and pouring in a terrible fire. Gen. SEDGEWICK here rode up and ordered us to fall back. The Rebels had it all their own way, till reaching our battery, part of our Regiment formed cannister when the howitzers checked them, and a new line of ours drove them back. In the afternoon, what was left of our Brigade moved to the right about half a mile in support of the battery during the remainder of the action. The killed and wounded in our company are: KILLED - Corp. David CAREY, James DONOHUE, Henry GILLMAN, John MURPHY, Martin BUCK -- WOUNDED: Sgt. Joseph ANDREWS,
