Sgt. Martin GORMAN, Alex HANNA, William TRAVER, Timothy HEENAN, James DOUGAN, Donald CAMERON, Sidney HOCKRIDGE, Henry LORMAN, Frank HAYDEN - TAKEN PRISIONER - Robert H. HARTLEY. None of the wounded are considered dangerous; they are to be taken to Haggerstown today. The poor fellows killed were decently buried on the north side of a schoolhouse near the battle field and their graves enclosed with a rail fence. The killed are all West Trojans, and we believe, with the exception of GILMAN, unmarried men. He leaves a wife and three small children to mourn his loss.

Page 2:3 - BLOWN UP - LOSS OF LIFE - The Troy Whig understands that a telegraph was received Monday by Darwin JONES, of the 10th Ward, from his son, stating that the Propeller MONITOR, formerly FILLEY of West Troy, was blown up, and that he, JONES was the only person aboard saved. The MONITOR was owned by Capt. E.R. SPRONG, and others, who was her Captain. Mr.JONES was Engineer. The Propeller has been running this season on the River here, and along the Coast. The telegraph was dated at Middletown, Conn.

Page 2:4 - The funeral of Capt. S.S. LEE PERKINS of the 2d Regiment took place Sunday afternoon in Troy. The services were held at the Third St. Baptist Church, Rev. J.E. CHESSHIRE, Chaplain of the Regiment delivering the sermon. The Citizens Corps Rifle Company & Artillery, together with severalofficers and a detachment of soldiers from the 2d Regiment participated in the funeral cortege.

OCTOBER 8, 1862

Page 2:2 - Gen. SIBLEY, was after the murdering Indians in Minnesota, writes from the mouth of Crow Wing River, September 28th that he met a party of friendly Indians who were bringing back 91 prisioners mostly young woman, whom they had rescued from Little Crow's party. On the 23d there was a fight at Wood Lake, in which the Indians were defeated.

Page 2:3 - The funeral of Capt. John KELLY of the 104th Regt., who was killed at the Battle of Antitam, was attended at St. Peter's Church Troy on Friday afternoon last. Several of the City military companies took part in the funeral cortege.

Page 2:4 - DEATH OF OTIS WOOD - Mr. Otis WOOD who has been for a long time a resident of this Village,
