- At Elizabeth, N.J. on Oct 2d by Rev. E. KEMPSHALL, Mr. Charles STONE of Green Island & Miss Charlotte A. HAMILTON of the former place.

Page 2:1 - SUICIDE - SINGULAR MEANS TO EFFECT THE PURPOSE - Coroner WASSERBACK, Friday held an inquest upon the body of Mrs. Ellen KELLY, age 40 years who committed suicide under singular circumstances. Mrs. KELLY dissolved some common lime in water and after procuring a strong solution, drank the quantity of about two table-spoons full. Most excruciating pains followed, and death resulted in a few hours. Mrs. KELLY resided at 63 Broadway, Albany and leaves ten children. The verdict of the jury was in accordance with the above facts.

A lock tender named John HAYDEN residing in Cohoes, died on Sunday morning last from injuries received by one of the levers of the lock striking his head a few days previous. An inquest was held and the jury returned a verdict in accordance with these facts. The deceased leaves a wife and six children to mourn his loss.

Page 2:2 - FUNERAL - The remains of Martin BUCK, a member of the West Troy Company 34th Regt. N.Y. V. who was killed at the Battle of Antietam, reached home on Saturday. His funeral took place Sunday afternoon and was attended by nearly the entire Fire Department - the deceased having been a member of Engine Company No. 3, - together with Empire State Engine Co. No. 5 of Troy. The services took place at the Washington St. M.E. Church, Rev. W.R. BROWN preaching an appropriate sermon from the 14th verse of the 14th chapter of Job. "If a man dies shall he live again". The funeral cortege moved in the following order.....(lists Engine Companies etc.) The remains of the deceased soldier were deposited in the receiving vault of the Albany Rural Cemetery.
