Revs. Dr. COIT & E.W. MAXCY of Troy and Rev. A.T. TWING of Lansingburgh assisted the Rector Rev. Mr. WALSH in the funeral services.

The funeral of Lt. Francis DARGAN, of the 30th Reg't took place in Lansingburgh on Sunday afternoon and was attended by the Lansingburgh Fire Departments with large delegations from Troy, West Troy, Albany, Cohoes & Waterford. About 25 companies in all were in line. Among which were Rip Van Winkle Engine Co. No. 1, Protection Engine Co. No. 2, Conqueror Engine Co. No. 3 and Oswald Hose Co. No.1 of this Village. They presented an exceedingly creditable appearance. The funeral ceremonies took place at the Roman Catholic Church in that place and the remains were interred in the cemetery a short distance east of the Village.

## OCTOBER 29, 1862

Page 2:2 - FUNERAL - The funeral of John MURPHY, a member of Co. A., 34th Reg't N.Y.V. and also R.V.W. Engine Co. No. 1, who was killed in the Battle of Antietam took place in this Village on Sunday afternoon last, the services being held at St. Patrick's Church. In addition to our Village firemen delegations were present from Cohoes, Waterford, Lansingburgh & Troy. The funeral cortege moved in the following order......

Page 2:2 - Samuel S. DAUCHY Superintendent of Troy Gas Works, died in that City at an early hour on Sunday morning. The flags upon the various steam fire engine houses of that City were on Monday flying at half-mast out of respect to his memory.

Page 2:3 - DEATH OF JUSTICE STEWART - Justice D.C. STEWART's illness, of which our readers have been advised, terminated fatally at an early hour on Sunday last, - there are very few men whose demise will be more felt by the community. As a Magistrate he was perhaps, unequaled, always bringing to the discharge of his official duties a good legal knowledge as well as firmness of character. Mr. S. had held the position of Justice of the Peace for nearly ten years and was also at the time of his death Village Attorney. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon from his late residence and was largely attended by the citizens of this and adjoining places.

Page 2:4 - Catharine HARRINGTON died in Albany Sunday from an overdoze of laudanum. The Coroner's Jury were unable to determine whether it was administered by herself or some other person.
