Page 2:4 - PROBABLE MURDER - Officer BROWN at a late hour Thursday night arrested Wm. J. CHURCH, a shoemaker, residing in the lower portion of the Village, on suspicion of having murdered his wife, - whose corpse with several wounds in the breast, evidently inflicted with a knife, was found lying in the house. CHURCH was conveyed to the lockup, and the next day Coroner BRENNAN summoned the jury and proceeded to hold an inquest. After a long and quite thorough investigation of the case the jury rendered the following verdict, "That said Ann CHURCH came to her death etc....."

JANUARY 28, 1863

Page 2:1 - The funeral of Col. Thomas B. WILLIAMS, of the 25th Illinois Volunteers, who was killed at the Battle of Murfreesboro, took place in Troy on Sunday afternoon, the remains being interred in Oakwood Cemetery. The military companies of the city were in attendance, and an attachment of regulars from the Arsenal under Sgt. SMITH, acted as mourners. Col. W. was a brother-in-law of Mr. William GLEASON of this Village.
