Page 2:2 - CASE OF DROWNING - About 9 o'clock Friday morning, the body of a man named James McNULTY was found on the culvert near the Patroons, a short distance north of Albany. The deceased was a moulder and worked in Rathbone's Furnace. He had been missing a week. He was last seen alive at Mr. MALONE's Saloon, North Ferry St., near the foundry. He left there at 10 o'clock P.M. and said that he was going tohis home in 'Limerick'. It is supposed that in walking along the Northern Railroad, and not observing the opening in the Bridge across the culvert he fell through and no person coming to his assistance was drowned. Coroner HARRIGAN of Albany, was notified, and held an inquest. The jury rendered a verdict of accidental drowning. The deceased was about 60 years of age and leaves a wife and several children to mourn his untimely end.

Page 2:5 - Acteamster named James KEGAN was instantly killed on River Street Troy on Friday morning last, he being thrown from his wagon and one of the wheels passing directly over his neck, severing the jugular vein.

Page 2:4 - FATAL ACCIDENT AT EAST ALBANY - A melancholy accident occurred at East Albany on Friday. Honorable George VAN SANDFORD, ex-District Attorney of Rensselaer Co., met with his death under the following painful circumstances. He was waiting the departure of the train for Troy, when, while standing behind a car on the track, the train backed up against the car, knocking him down and passing over him. His clothes caught in the wheel, and he was dragged a distance of 45 feet, the wheels of the car passing over his body several times. His left arm was severed from his body, and he was so terribly mutilated that he died in less than an hour. Mr. S. was a lawyer of eminent ability, and the author of several standard law books. He was a member of assembly from Columbia County in 1852, and from Rensselaer Co. in 1856. He had a beautiful homestead at Schodack Landing, where his family reside. They will have the sympathy of all who knew the deceased, and who loved him for his noble manliness and virtue.
