Page 2:4 - DEATH OF MRS. DUDLEY - Mrs. Blandina DUDLEY died at her residence in Albany Friday morning, at the advanced age of 80. Mrs. D. was a lady of high social qualities and of all womanly virtues. In her later years she has been profuse in the expenditure of her great wealth upon religious, scientific and benevolent objects. She leaves a monument in the Dudley Observatory; and a pleasant memory with all who knew her.

SUDDEN DEATH - Jonathan HART, an old resident of this Village, was found dead in his bed on Thursday morning last. His death was probably caused by congestion of the lungs. Mr. H. some years since held the office of Justice of the Peace.

Page 2:5 - DIED - At Colvert, N.Y. Feb. 28th, Naomi PRATT, wife of Col. CHAUNCEY PRATT and mother of the wife of Rev. Dr. GREGORY of this Village., age 77 years.

MARCH 18, 1863

Page 2:2 - Capt. James M. ATWOOD, one of the oldest citizens in the Village of Lansingburgh, died Friday at his residence in that place. He was for years engaged in river navigation and had accumulated quite a competence in that business.

Elias PATTISON for many years an active energetic and prospered citizen of Troy died at Fishkill on Wednesday, aged about 75.

MARCH 25, 1863

Page 2:1 - DEATH OF GENERAL SUMNER - Major General E.V. SUMNER died at the residence of his son-in-law Col. W.W. TEALL, in Syracuse, Saturday morning of congestion of the lungs, after an illness of five days. The General was under orders to report at St. Louis for duty and was on the point of starting when he was assailed by the disease which terminated his life. He had been in the service more than 43 years and was justly distinguished for his patriotism, courage and magnanimity. His last words were, "God save my Country - the United States of America" - The news of his death caused a deep sensation in Washington, and in military circles in all parts of the country. In the Army of the Potomac, he was considered one of the most heroic and daring men of the age. He has often expressed a wish to die in the thick<sup>est</sup> of the fight.
