Page 2:5 - DIED - At Watervliet Arsneal July 15th, Caroline L., wife of Dr. S. G. D'CAMP, US Army and daughter of the late Judge HITCHCOCK of Mobile, Alabama.

JULY 29, 1863

Page 2:1 - The Hon. John J. CRITTENDEN, died Sunday morning at his residence at Frankfort, KY. His disease was old age and general debility. He retained his faculties til the last moment, <sup>d</sup>ying without pain or struggle.

Page 2:3 - KILLED - Lt. Col. GREEN of the 48th Regiment, who was killed at Fort WAGONER, was a resident of Troy. He exhibited great bravery before the enemy.

The remains of Capt. Robert B. EVERETT of Co. E., 76th Reg't who was killed at the Battle of Gettysburgh, arrived at his late home in Watervliet, on Wednesday night last, and his funeral took place from the Methodist Church in Newtonville, Friday afternoon.

Page 2:3 - DROWNED - A lad named MAYO about 15 years of age, was drowned in the Canal, in the rear of Messrs. A. VIELE & Sons Foundry, on Saturday afternoon last. He fell from a raft, and being unable to swim, perished. His body was shortly after recovered and an inquest held.

The late Brig. General George C. STRONG formerly of the Arsenal who was wounded while leading the charge upon Fort Wagner, we noticed last week, died in New York City from the effect of such wounds, on Thursday night last. In his death the Army loses a brave and accomplished officer - society a true gentleman. During his stay at the Arsenal in this Village, he made many friends in this vicinity, was greatly respected by all the soldiers and employees at the Post. His funeral took place on Saturday, from the Methodist Church corner of 22d St. 4th Ave., N.Y. It was attended by Major General BUTLER, Staff-General CANBY & Staff, and large numbers of graduates of West Point. The coffin was of rosewood and bore a silver plate with the inscription "Brigadier General George C. STRONG died July 30, 1863, aged 30 years 9 months & 13 days. Rev. Dr. HAGANY read the 15th Chapter, 1st Epistle of Corinthians. Rev. Dr. DURBIN pronounced a eloquent and impressive discourse. The procession
