Page 2:5 - FALLING OF A PILE OF LUMBER - A CHILD KILLED - On Saturday a sad accident occurred in the upper part of the City of Albany while a child, four years of age, son of Edward DEADO was playing in the street at the corner of Lumbert & Water Streets, a pile of lumber which carelessly had been left there, fell upon the child killing it almost instantly. It was extricated in a very few minutes but life was found to be extinct. Coroner James ALLEN was notified and held an inquest. The jury rendered a verdict censuring in severe terms, the person or persons who had left the lumber in such a dangerous position.

Nathanial AMES, one of the last survivors of the Revolution, was interred on the 30th of last month, at Madison, Wis. He was born in April 1761, in Conn. In 1779 he entered the Continental service, and served in various positions to the close of the War, having been present at the execution of ANDRE and other remarkable events. From the age of 30 to to 75 he was a Wesleyan Methodist Preacher in Steuben, Oneida County, N.Y. whence he removed to the Town of Oregon, Wis. where he closed a long and honorable life.

Page 2:5 - DIED - At the residence of her father Thomas VANDEKAR (deceased), Mrs. Catharine M. VANDEWERKEN, relict of John P. VANDERWERKEN of Cohoes, age 49 years.

Page 2:3 - Dr. Richard BLOSS, an eminent physician of Troy, died on Sunday at his residence in that City. His funeral took place yesterday afternoon and was attended by the several Masonic Lodges in the City, of which order he was a prominent member.

Page 2:5 - DIED - In this Village on Thursday 10th inst. Catherine Isabella daughter of Dr. Henry & Margaret Mary BRENNAN, age 2 years & 9 months.

SEPTEMBER 23, 1863

Page 2:3 - The remains of Col. M.K. BRYAN of Albany, who was killed at Port Hudson arrived in Albany yesterday morning, and the funeral obsequies will take place this afternoon the procession moving at 1 o'clock. The military, the fire department, and civic societies of the neighborhood will participate in the obsequies. The remains of the lamented Colonel will be interred in the Rural Cemetery.
