Page 2:1 - Rev. T. Starr KING, the well-known and popular lecturer, formerly of Boston, but later of San Francisco, died at the latter City on Tuesday last after a brief illness of diphtheria.

Page 2:3 - TERRIBLE ROW IN A HORSE CAR - Thursday afternoon, there were a number of civilians got in a horse car at this place for Albany. Some of them were under the influence of liquor. On the passage down they got into an argument relative to Abe LINCOLN and Jeff DAVIS. During the dispute they used some very harsh language, that was not very agreeable to the numerous ladies in the car. The conductor DYER entered and put a stop to it at once, but it was renewed. After passing the Patroons, the inmates became so turbulent that the conductor rang the bell and stopped the car. He called in the driver, also a man who was engaged in clearing the track and they undertook to quell the disturbance. Instead of doing that, they increased its fury and in a few moments a free fight was going on. The women undertook to escape, and they were jostled and knocked about in a rude manner. About a dozen persons were engaged in the row, some half dozen of whom were dreadfully cut and mangled. Word was dispatched to the Station House and a posse of men arrived at the scene. - They succeeded in arresting only two of the rioters, the rest escaping. Their names are Barney MALONE and James LYONS. - MALONE's face was horribly disfigured. They gave bail before an Albany justice for a further hearing.

Page 2:6 - A FATAL ACCIDENT - An accident of a most painful nature occurred in the Village of Johnsburgh, Warren County on Tuesday of last month. John HAMMOND, a respected citizen of that Village, was almost instantly killed by the accidental discharge of a pistol in the hands of a man named John FULLER jr. It seems the two were sitting at the bar room of LOVELAND's Hotel in Johnsburgh, no other person being present when some conversation occurred about trading a watch for a revolver. The weapon was produced by FULLER and handed to HAMMOND, who after snapping it two or three times, handed it back to FULLER, remarking that it was not in good order.....Mr. HAMMOND was formerly a Deputy Sheriff of the County. He leaves a wife and three children to mourn his untimely end.....
