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farm but took up their habitations in this Village. Here the 'old gentlemen' and the "buxom lassie" lived in conubial felicity for the entire space of three days, when the young wife left the uncle of General HALLACK, the friend and companion of a celebrated man, - disconsolate, taking with her all his cash she could lay hands on. Report hath it she was overtaken and is now in durance vile.

Page 2:4 - FUNERAL OBSEQUIES TO THE REMAINS OF COL. BENEDICT - The last tribute of respect to the late Col. Lewis BENEDICT jr was paid to his remains Monday afternoon. Among the bearers were Col. John W. HARCOURT, Col. AINSWORTH, Major Ambrose CASSIDY and Col. James McQUADE of Utica. At noon the bells commenced tolling their solemn knell in honor of the departed dead. Minute guns were also fired during the moving of the procession. The ceremonies took place at the Second Presbyterian Church, Albany, which was densely packed with friends and acquaintances of the deceased. They were of a truly imposing character. The funeral discourse was delivered by the Rev. Dr. BRIDGEMAN. An appropriate and feeling prayer was offered up by the Rev. Dr. SPRAGUE, and the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Dr. POHLMAN. The remains of the noble hero were deposited in the cemetery with appropriate military honors.

Page 3:1 - DEAD - Col. James SWIFT of the 25th Regt. National Guard died at Albany on Sunday evening last.

CHILD KILLED - About 12 o'clock Monday noon a boy named FLEMING, 4 or 5 years of age, was run over by a wagon in Broad St., near the side cut and instantly killed. The wagon which was owned by John CARY, of this Village, was loaded with corn, and had stopped in order that a leaky bag might be closed up. While it was standing still, the lad crept under the vehicle and
