Page 3:2 - FATAL ACCIDENT - On Monday about 12 o'clock as Nelson OOTHOUT a man about 27 years of age, residing in Watervliet, about two miles west of this place, was matching a team from a wagon, one of the horses stepped on one end of the whiftletree causing the other to fly up striking OOTHOUT upon the back of the neck killing him instantly. His sudden demise has cast a gloom over a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

KILLED - Among the heroic dead of the late Battle are Lt. Col. MYER & E.P. JONES of the 125th Regiment. The bodies of both are shortly expected in Troy, and will be conveyed to their final resting places with appropriate honors. Capt. J. was well-known to most of our citizens - having many years since been in the government service of the Arsenal here and later leader of a band and music dealer in Troy.

Page 2:4 - KILLED & WOUNDED - The following is a correct list of the killed, missing & wounded of Co. K, 43d Regiment which was recruited principally from this Village (in the terrific battles of the Wilderness), as we learn from a private letter from Capt. THOMPSON to a gentleman in this place.

Page 2:5 DIED - In this Village on Sunday 22d inst. of consumption, Thos. H. SCHUYLER.

## JUNE 1, 1864

Page 2:1 - Col. TAYLOR of the 2d Vermont who died at the Metropolitan Hotel, New York on Monday from wounds received in the Battle of the Wilderness, enlisted in his Regiment as a private at the beginning of the War and rose to the rank he held before he was 21 years old.

Page 2:5 - DROWNED - Hofard EVERETT, a man about 55 years of age, hand on board the Canal boat ABIGAIL of Vienna, was drowned at an early hour yesterday morning, in the Canal, a short distance from the Stickney Bridge. He was last seen alive about midnight, and was then lying upon the deck of the boat. It is probable that while asleep here, he rolled off into the water. Coroner BRENNAN is to hold an inquest upon his remains this morning.
