Page 2:4 - FOUND DEAD - Samuel DAVIDSON, a cartman for many years past residing at 169 Orange St., Albany, disappeared very mysteriously on Wed. morning last. He arose quite early in the day and placing what money he had in the pocket of his youngest son, disappeared, no one knew where. A search was made, and last evening his lifeless body was found on the farm of his brother four miles out on the road to New Scotland (Knickerbocker Monday)

Page 2:4 cont from Page 215 - His death, it is said, occurred on the very day when the news reached his residence of the successful issue of the suit in his favor against McCORMICK. A grand prize medal was awarded to MANNY's reaper at the Paris Exhibition, and Prince NAPOLEON, it is stated, commended it over all others.

Page 2:5 - DIED - In this Village on the 20th inst. Charles HERROD, age 26 years, 5 mos. & 3 days.

APRIL **11, 1860**

Page 2:5- DEATH OF DR. Wm. C. ROGERS - It is with feelings of no ordinary solemity that we announce the death of our friend and old companion, Dr. Wm. C. ROGERS. This event occurred about 7 o'clock this morning at his home on Green Island. About a week ago, the Doctor was seized with inflamation of the lungs, - the result of cold contracted in the pursuit of his profession. The attack was very violent, and a fatal result was apprehended from the first. He continued to sink rapadly despite the best medical attendance, and this morning died. Dr. ROGERS was 29 years of age. He was a man of brilliant attainments, not only in the profession, but in the walks of literature, and had he survived, few had promise of higher position or more extended influence. About four years ago Dr. R. was attached to our paper as an editor, and since then has continued to write occasionly, articles in his peculiar department of study which always attracted attention by their ability. A year ago, he was selected to deliver an address before the State Medical Society, - a rare and flattering compliment to one of his age. As a citizen, he was esteemed in all his relations, and by a frank and genial disposition, attached hosts of friends to himself, whereever he moved. As a husband and father, he was ever kind and affectionate, and the weight of this affliction will fall heavily upon a devoted wife and two little children. Cut down when apparently in the bloom of health and the flower of manhood, a whole community will mourn his loss. (Troy Times Saturday)
