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Page 2:5 - DIED - In Carroll, on the 24th ult, Mr. John OWENS, age 107 years. The deceased was born in Salisbury, Conn., served in the Old French War, a Soldier & Pensioner of the Revolution. He removed to Warren, Pa in 1807, settled in Chautauge Co., in 1812 where he has since resided. He had a remarkably strong & robust constitution, his habits were remarkably active, and at the age of 94 would mount a spirited horse from the ground. He had a vast fund of anecdotes, like that hardy race of men who achieved our independence, he wore but did not rust out. His disease was emphatically called by his physician, old age.

APRIL 12, 1843

Page 2:5 - DIED - In the Village of West Troy, three minutes after midnight, 7th inst., Mr. John ROGERS, late of Huntington, L.I. in the 79th year of his age. His mortal remains have been deposited in a vault in Troy until the opening of navigation to permit his bereaved companion to remove the deceased to Huntington for final interment. The deceased died in the full hopes which a saving interest in atonement imparts, Yet the circumstances of his death were exceedingly painful.

The deceased arrived in this Village, on a visit to resident friends, on the 26th of November, intending to spend the winter here; the winter however proving much longer than usual, and feeling anxious to return home, he went on the 3d inst to Troy to ascertain the time the stages leave, when slipping from the curb of the sidewalk in Congress St., he dislocated his hip and was otherwise injured; he was placed in an arm chair and received some attention from Dr. BACKUS, but requesting to be brought home, he was placed in a sleigh & driven home, where he received the immediate and prompt attention of Dr. HENRY of Troy, who, after two visits turned his patient over to the attention of Drs. HAMMOND & BUTTS of this side of the River. But not withstanding all their efforts and the unremitting attention of kind friends who knew him sufficiently long to love him, he fell asleep in Jesus early on Friday morning. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and had been a Professor of Religion more than 50 years. The funeral services were performed by the Rev. B.I. LANE, Presbyterian Minister of this Village on the 9th inst. "The Memory of the Just is Blessed" (communicated by C.H. HOSKIN, Baptist Minister, West Troy April 10, 1843)
