PHILLIP S. O'NEAL DIES AT CHICKAMAUGA HOME

Philip Sherrii! O'Neal, 84, prominent farmer of near Jersey, died yesterday morning at 6:30 at his home after a long illness. Funeral services will be held from Chickamauga Baptist church this afternoon at 1, the Rev. Claude E. Sprague officiating. Interment will be in the Tyner cemetery.

Honorary pallbearers will be: J. M. Pee, Wüllam Lightfoot, Sherrill Benton, John Pot, George Walker and S. M. Howard. Active pallbearers will be: Lee, John and Hannibal Lightfoot, Fred Sterchi, Wallace Moore and John Swency, all nephews of the deceased.

Mr. O'Neal, who was a Confederate reteran, was born at Madison, Ga., on July 7, 1836. He served in the Confederate army under Gen. White, having enlisted at Cieveland in 1861. He took part in many of the important battles fought during the Civil war.

He was twice married. Children surviving him by his first wife are J. F. and B. B. C'Neal, of Arkansas. Survivors of the second marriage are his wife, who was Miss Annie McBride, and the fellowing children: Mrs. H. Moss, Mrs. A. E. Dawson, Mrs. Thomas Ryall. Mrs. Rudolph Haensler, of New York; Mrs. W. E. Shelton. of Sacramento, Cal.; Mrs. Benton Potter, Fred D. and P. S. O'Neal, Jr., of Chattanooga.

Deceased had lived in Hamilton county since 1875. He was a devout Baptist and in earlier days was known to drive as far as fifty miles in order that his congregation might not fail of representation in the associations. He retired from business several years and had been an invalid for twelve months.

AT HIS KNOXVILLE HOME

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The death in a Brooklyn hospital yesterday of Richard Lamb, widely known constructing engineer, was announced today.

Mr. Lamb, who was 61 years old, surveyed the Albermarle and Chesapeake canal planned drainage of the Dismat swamp, built the largest coal pier in the world and the Norfolk system of sewers, and for a time was chief engineer of the Wilmington, Newbern & Norfolk railroad. He also designed an electric canal boat towing plant and erected a test plant for it on the Erie canal.
