## Mystery of the Stidham Bench in Bletchley Park, England Solved

Editor's note: The following message was sent by email from Noria Stidham Gerig (DCM-101).

My husband, Warren, and I were visiting our vacation home in London, England in April, which we have had for more than 25 years. Each visit we try to take a day trip outside of the city.

This year we took a train to Bletchley Park, about 50 miles north of London. Bletchley Park was England's best kept secret during World War II, as it housed the enigma machine captured from a German U-Boat. A huge decoding machine called "Collosus" was built to decode messages sent to the German high command. This technology was credited with shortening the war and perhaps saving many lives.

We sat down on a bench there for a brief rest when I noticed a brass plaque attached. It read, "To the memory of Jimmy and Peggy Stidham, reunited in love 20ll. USAAC." Apparently, Jimmy was stationed there during World War II, and members of their family perhaps dedicated the bench after the last one passed away. I began to wonder if they might be part of our extended family.

A quick email to TSS Historian, David Stidham and the mystery of Jimmy and Peggy Stidham was solved.

Military service for Peggy: Served in World War II in Great Brittain's Women's Auxiliary Air Force (WAAF) serving at Bletchley Park (Station X) decoding Enigma messages.
