

TIPTON FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA Shared by Ruth TIPTON Smith

What follows is the second in a series of stories, biographies and other information shared by our long-time member, Ruth TIPTON Smith, as researched and reported by her and other members of her family. Because of the wealth of information provided, it will be limited to family newsletters, certain biographies and other articles of interest. I have not included bibliographies, source information, detailed lineages nor will it likely be in chronological order as reported herein. - Editor

The Tipton Family Association of America (TFAA), a non-profit organization, was founded to foster historical research concerning the descendants and antecedents of Jonathan Tipton, who died in Baltimore, Maryland in 1757.

Excerpts from the TFAA Newsletter, Spring 1999

Spring is here. Or at least that's what the calendar says. These 90+ days in Texas make me wonder. However, the intensity of the storms we've had, both rain and electrical, lets me know that it is just spring; and it is going to get hotter, much hotter!!

My grandfather, Lee William Tipton, and George Aaron Tipton, Sr. were brothers. Lennie Ruth Tipton is the granddaughter of George Tipton, Sr. Shortly after her parents divorced, Ruth left Waco. Growing up, my dad would mention her (they are the same age). Consequently, when I began my Tipton research, I started looking for her.

George Aaron Tipton, Jr. died December 9, 1955. His obituary listed his daughter (Ruth) as Mrs. Layne Smith living in Houston, Texas. I tried calling the Layne Smiths in Houston, with no success. And with "Layne" being an unusual spelling, I felt like this little venture was going to be easy and quick. Wrong!

While my dad was in the hospital two years ago, I got a call from a friend who suggested that I contact this person, "Linda Ruth Tipton Smith." Her bio was printed in a genealogy society newsletter. It said she was the daughter of George Tipton, Jr., son of George Tipton, Sr., all of Waco, Texas. I was so excited – beyond control. And when I found out which newsletter, I was even more beside myself, "Mid-Cities Genealogy Society Newsletter."

I was living in Grapevine at the time and was a member of the Irving Genealogical Society. The mid-cities area is about 5-6 miles from Grapevine. There was no listing in the phone book and no directory assistance listing for Layne or Linda Smith. I called the president of the society, got the phone number, called, no answer, left a message. I waited a few days but no call. By this time I was really anxious, so I reread the bio, which stated that her mother and stepfather still lived in Houston. Directory assistance did have a phone number for the Bartos'. I called the number and guess who answered the phone, "Ruth Tipton Smith." She said my calling her, and being a Tipton so closely related, was the best Christmas present she had ever had. I found Ruth on December 24. So I actually found her in Houston, where my search began. She and her husband, Layne, live less than 5 miles from my parents in Hurst, Texas and have since 1974. We moved from Abilene to Hurst in 1972. She attends the church where I was married (in 1973) and where my daughter and I attended when we lived in Hurst. I have since found out from Ruth that when I first started my search for "Mrs. Layne Smith" she was not doing genealogy. Now she is quite involved: she is treasurer of the Mid-Cities Genealogical Society and volunteers at the Southwest Region of the National Archives.

Bios are great. You never know who will read it. They help us to identify people and with any luck – make a new connection.

STATE LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES Open for Researchers on Second Saturdays

Beginning earlier this year, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission expanded its hours of operation to accommodate researchers. The Commission's three public service areas – the Texas State Archives, Texas Family Heritage Research Center and the Reference and Information Center – are open from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. the second Saturday of each month. The facility is located at 1201 Brazos Street in Austin.

Resources and services available include:

Archival government records dating back to the 18th century, Newspapers, Books, Journals, Legal Resources, Manuscripts, Photographs, Historical Maps, Free Access to Online Databases including TexShare, Ancestry and Fold 3, Genealogical Collections, County Histories, City Directories, U.S. and Texas Government Publications, Interlibrary Loan Service, Public Access Computers, Digital Microform Reader/Printers, Walk-Up Book Scanner as well as knowledgeable and dedicated staff.

Please Note: Researchers using original documents in the State Archives for the first time will be required to register and must present valid photo identification and proof of current address.

On Second Saturdays, no materials will be pulled from closed stack areas after 3:30 PM. In addition, all archival materials will be removed from the reading room at 3:45 PM.

Regular public service hours are Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:45 PM. The library is closed on most federal holidays.

Topics of the Day

"GATA GACC! DNA and Genetic Genealogy Today" - This lecture covers where we are today using DNA for genealogy, maximizing Y-DNA, mitochondrial DNA, and autosomal DNA test results to contribute to genealogical research goals.

"Going Nuclear: DNA Discoveries to Trace All Lines of Descent" - This lecture covers the advances made in DNA testing for genealogical research and shows how to use these new test results to advance your personal research. Learn to link families using autosomal DNA test results from any testing company. Includes how to use test results such as those from 23andMe, AncestryDNA, and Family Tree DNA Family Finder tests.

"Paternal Lines: Y-DNA" - This lecture covers the basics of Y-DNA testing for males, and how to find DNA projects and testing companies. Learn details of Y-DNA testing including how to analyze test results. Findings can corroborate your paper trail or place you on the right research path.
