TOPIC:

**The Portal to Texas
History**

Dreanna has been with the University of North Texas Libraries since 2003. She holds an MLS from UNT, and her interests include exploring how digital cultural heritage collections can most effectively be used in education, and working with museums, libraries and archives to place their materials online. She began her career managing partnerships with the Portal to Texas History's 280 plus collaborators, including dozens of museum partners. The American Library Association selected Dreanna as a participant in its prestigious Emerging Leaders program in 2007. In 2014, she was selected for the Texas Library Association's leadership institute, Tall Texans.

In 2011 Dreanna became the first librarian elected to the Council of the Texas Association of Museums, and was appointed to their executive board in 2013. She is a past Chair of the Advisory Board for the Texas State Library and Archives Commission's "Train to Share" IMLS funded program. She serves on the Advisory Boards for the Texas House Oral History Project, the PBS Texas Our Texas programming initiative, and the Community Advisory Board for KERA/KXT, Public Media for North Texas.

TIPTON FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

Shared by Ruth TIPTON Smith

What follows is the first in a series of stories, biographies and other information shared by our long-time member, Ruth TIPTON Smith, as researched and reported by her and other members of her family. Because of the wealth of information provided, it will be limited to family newsletters, certain biographies and other articles of interest. I have not included bibliographies, source information, detailed lineages nor will it likely be in chronological order as reported herein. - Editor

The Tipton Family Association of America (TFAA), a non-profit organization, was founded to foster historical research concerning the descendants and antecedents of Jonathan Tipton, who died in Baltimore, Maryland in 1757.

Excerpts from the TFAA Newsletter, Winter 1999

It's that time again. The next issue of the TFAA Newsletter. One new addition this time is me, Debbie Tipton Kunze, as the new Editor. I am single, have been a student of the Tipton family for several years. I am a skeptic (especially when sources are not cited); however, it has kept me out of trouble several times.

I was born August 30, 1954 in Waco, Texas. In 1963 I moved with my parents, William Edward Tipton and Nelga Jeanne Goodwin, along with my younger sister, Karen, to Fort Worth. My youngest sister, Cheryl, was born in 1967, six weeks before we moved to Abilene, Texas. After living there for four years, the five of us moved to Hurst, Texas. In 1973, I married Robert E Kunze. We had one child, Leslie Anne Kunze, born April 15, 1976. About 16 years ago I became a student of genealogy, and one of the things I have learned is that we are always students; there is always something new to learn.


Several years ago, my skepticism paid off. I thought that Edward Tipton who came over in 1668 was the father of Jonathan. I wanted to believe everything I read, mainly because I didn't know any better. However, I soon became aware of the fact that we, as students of learning family history, are either searchers or researchers. I have learned that I am a researcher, and I'm proud of that trait. What I found out about Edward was in the county records of Charles County, Maryland. In specific, Edward was adjudged to be 18 years old when he immigrated in 1668. Consequently he could not be Jonathan's father under either scenario that I had theorized. If Jonathan's obit was correct in that he was born in 1639 (which I strongly doubted), then he was born before Edward. And if the obit was incorrect (1659 mistaken as 1639), Edward would have been about 9 years old when Jonathan was born. So neither theory fit for Edward being Jonathan's father. I feel fortunate that I can look beyond what is in black and white, especially when sources are not cited, then check it out! But that is the paralegal in me, which is my profession. I've worked for 10 years with the U.S. Government. I'm not sure whether genealogy has helped me more in my profession, or my job has helped more in my real career – genealogy.

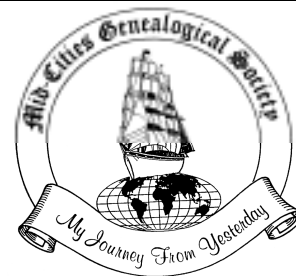
