Family History Tips



Electronic version of the cardboard box - Create a folder labeled "2007" somewhere on your computer hard drive. All during this new year, add a copy of family photos taken, newsy family e-mails written and received (they make a great journal/history) and new family history items located and copied--census records, ancestors' patriarchal blessings, histories found, etc. It really is easy to add a little here and there. Next December, burn a CD containing all of this valuable information and make copies for your relatives. Questions/Answers



QUESTION: I am documenting Scottish research. I have found that when looking up some marriage dates in the Scottish Church Records that some married couples have their marriages entered in two different parishes on two different dates. Since the dates are usually close together I have assumed that these are marriage posting dates in the parishes of the bride and groom. Do I use the parish and the date that is the latest?

ANSWER: According to one of our Scottish Research instructors here at the Center, this does happen occasionally, but she would use the earliest date, then note the second date and parish in the notes, as well as her assumptions concerning the 2 dates.

QUESTION: A ward member approached me today asking if it were possible to get a better copy of a Citizenship Certificate issued to one of his ancestors by the Territory of Utah in the 1870's. The copy he has is a many-copied one and the writing is very faint and mostly unreadable. He would like a better copy. Is this type of certificate a one-time thing, given to the person at the time of citizenship or does the State have a record?

ANSWER: He should be able to find what he needs at the Utah State Archives. Some are even starting to appear online, i.e. [1868-1869 Box Elder County Certificates of Citizenship](#). The Family History Library has also microfilmed many of them. Check their online catalog at [FamilySearch.org](#).

[Utah Death Certificates](#) - The state's free online index to death certificates is now linked to original images of the historic documents. To search the index and view the certificates issued from 1905- 1954, go to <http://historyresearch.utah.gov/indexes/index.html>

[Danish Parish & Census](#) The Danish State Archives has parish registers and population censuses online. The actual image of the record is searchable, printable, and able to be saved electronically. They include parish registers older than 1892 and censuses for 1797, 1801, 1834, 1840, 1850, 1855, 1860 with others to follow. The website is www.arkivalieronline.dk Use is free, but you must register. Enter the county, district, and parish to get a list of records divided by years for births, deaths, marriages, confirmations, etc. The English page describing the project and giving instructions is www.arkivalieronline.dk/English/default.aspx ---submitted by Cathy Kimber, Tremonton, Utah
