Family History Tips



Look at the Walls - If you are visiting a genealogical society or local history library with your digital camera, be sure to look on the walls. A favorite item for wall display is a historic map of the area. With your flash disabled you can take photos of the map for later reference. I've used this approach to locate the creek named in a deed, the road assigned to an ancestor for road labor, the location of a forge mentioned in a court case, and several ancestors' farms labeled by name on the maps. Often these maps on display are the only copy available. Don't overlook them. --Janet Wright, "[Your Quick Tips](#)", Ancestry.com, 25 August 2008

Create a Family Cookbook - A perfect recipe for family history, a cookbook of collected heirloom recipes is a wonderful way to preserve memories of favorite meals shared with family. Contact your parents, grandparents, and other relatives and ask them to send you a few of their favorite family recipes. Have them include a story about each dish, where or who it was handed down from, why it is a family favorite, and when it was traditionally eaten (Christmas, family reunions, etc.). Whether you create a full-blown family cookbook, or just make copies for family and friends - this is a gift that will be cherished forever.

Questions/Answers

Question: When creating a GEDCOM in Legacy, is there a way to block information for living individuals?

Answer: On the GEDCOM Export screen there are 2 tabs - Options and Privacy. Click the Privacy tab and check either "Exclude living people totally" or "Suppress details for living people" whichever you prefer..

Question: In PAF, if a mother with six children by her first companion, marries a second husband, who adopts the six children, how is that relationship made clear in PAF--the children are the natural children of the wife but the adopted children of the husband. The husband and wife have additional child after their marriage.

Answer: PAF does not have a means of recording different relationships for each parent. You would need to explain it in your notes or create a separate adoption event.

Missouri Death Certificates, 1910 - 1958, a searchable index that links to a digitized image of the original death certificate. <http://www.sos.mo.gov/archives/resources/deathcertificates/> at the Missouri State Archives.

Spain, Albacete Province Births and Christenings, 1504-1905 and Marriages 1564-1899. Interestingly, while Ancestry.com has an index for the Albacete, Spain records but doesn't have images, FamilySearch Record Search Pilot has images but no index.
