Getting to know . . . SHARON STOECKLIN HOUCK



I was born 1 Nov 1947 in Cincinnati, Ohio, to Robert Lincoln Stoecklin and Margaret Ruth Gilson, as the eldest child of six (three girls, three boys). We moved to Seattle when I was age two, and my five younger siblings were all born out here. Five of us still live in Washington; one brother is in Nevada.

I attended Mercer Island, Washington, school for grades 1 through 4. Grades 5 through 12 were in Bellevue, I graduated in 1965 from Sammamish High School. I attended Washington State University in Pullman, graduating in 1969 in Office Administration.

In June of 1969, Don Houck and I were married. He then received orders to report to Malmstrom AFB in Great Falls, Montana, where we lived from July 1969 to September 1972. After the Air Force, Don was accepted at

Washington University to study physical therapy, and we moved to St. Louis, Missouri, where we lived from Aug 1973 to May 1975. We returned to the West Coast in 1975 and have lived in the Portland-Vancouver area since. Upon our return, I worked at Pendleton Woolen Mills for a few years before accepting a position to do medical transcription at home for 20+ years, allowing me to be at home while our son Kevin grew up. That position was finally discontinued, and I 'retired' in 2005.

Don and I have one son (Kevin born 1972 in Great Falls, Montana), who is married and lives in Thornton, Colorado. He and his wife have one daughter (our granddaughter) who is now 10 years old.

My interest in genealogy was initially sparked by a Christmas present one of my brothers gave all of his siblings. It was a chart of Gilson ancestors he had made for a class project at school. For the project, he had interviewed our grandfather. The chart contained names only – no dates or locations - but provided a starting point for my search. As kids, we had been told of a Norwegian connection; I was curious as to where they fit into the family. I didn't actively take up the search until sometime in the mid to late 1990's after Kevin graduated and moved to Colorado. Unfortunately, by then, many of the people who could have answered my questions had passed away.

Since that beginning, the names and locations that have entered the picture have grown and taken me places I would never have figured. That original chart pointed me in the right direction, although corrections to the chart have been necessary.

Maternal – Gilson, Tucker, Resseguie, Buswell, Lewis, Richardson (Reiersen)

How to Encrypt All Your Data Being Stored on Dropbox

Judging by the feedback that newsletter readers have posted at the end of those articles, many people agree with my opinion of the program. Dropbox appears to be very popular. However, it also has some drawbacks.

Dropbox is a multi-purpose program. It provides off-site backup of files that you select. Those files can be almost anything: text files, word processing documents, genealogy databases, pictures, .mp3 music files, or most anything else.

In addition to backups being stored on Dropbox's servers, the files also can automatically be copied (replicated) to other computers you own or to computers owned by friends or relatives. For instance, if you own both a desktop and a laptop computer, Dropbox can be used to make certain you always have the latest version of a file available on both systems. This can be great for keeping the latest version of your genealogy database on both systems.
