
WHAT CAN NEWSPAPERS CONTRIBUTE TO OUR RESEARCH?

Centennia – SUCH A DEAL!



















Centennia is a map-based guide to the history of Europe and the Middle East from the beginning of the 11th century to the present. It displays an evolving, dynamic map of the changing boundaries of the nations of the region, with a brief statement of the major events taking place. You can zoom in and out, stop the action, call up a more detailed explanation of events, or call for a map for any date you choose. You can print maps or import them into other software and use them in your family history or other projects.

There are versions of the program for DOS, Windows, Mac, and Power Mac. You can read all about it and see demos at http://www.clockwk.com, the web site of Clockwork Software, Inc., that produces the program.

Purchased individually, this program costs \$89, and it is worth it. BUT, if I can find 20 people who want to buy it, it will cost only \$19.95 apiece!

If you are interested in buying the program for this bargain price, this is how to do it:

- 1) E-mail me, genekuech@aol.com, or call me at 360-574-1492 (you can leave a voice message if no one answers) and tell me you want to order the program.
- 2) When 20 people have done this, I will register our group on the company's web site and they will give me a group order number, which I will e-mail or phone to those who have contacted me. I will also publish this number in the newsletter and ask Pat Bauer to put it on the CCGS web page. The group order number is good for 30 days.
- 3) Use the group order number when you go to the Clockwork web site or phone the company (at phone # below) to place your order. After at least 20 of us have ordered, they will start sending out our copies of the program.

Any number of people can order during the 30 days, so you don't have to be in the first 20 to get this price – as long as at least 20 people contact me to get the ball rolling. You don't have to belong to CCGS to order. You don't have to use the Internet – just call the company at 773-281-3132 or 888-281-3132 to find out if it will work on your computer. But don't order until you have the group order number, if you want the best price!

WARNING! WARNING! WARNING!

Be very cautious about upgrading your computer to Windows XP.

If you have an older computer, 2 years old or more, there is a very good chance that NO driver exists for your printer or your scanner. There might not be a driver for internal components as well, such as your modem, your CD drive, or some other component.

Magazine articles mention this problem, but I have not seen articles mentioning that **Your Software may not work**. Since XP is a 32-bit program, and most software is still 16-bit in design you are likely to have trouble.

Even if you are updating computers and the new one has XP, you may have problems getting drivers for your existing printer or scanner and your old software – perhaps even your genealogy program may not work under XP.

Our Spring Seminar was a great success, with 102 people attending. Shirley Hodges gave us an interesting and well-presented set of talks, ending each with a humorous or touching poem before taking questions.

She began the first session, on tracing female ancestors, with a litany of the legal and social restrictions that make it so difficult to identify our female ancestors. However, she countered that with advice on a number of places to look for clues and hard data. She pointed out the necessity of examining the records reflecting each of the many roles a woman might have filled: child, sister, student, wife, mother, stepmother, mother-in-law, niece, cousin, aunt, grandmother, widow, church member, Bible-record keeper, neighbor, business woman, naturalized citizen, even autograph collector and journal keeper.

I hoped that in the session on researching Ohio ancestors Shirley would tell me how to surmount my Ohio "brick walls." chase records). But she supplied us with a useful list of Ohio archives and genealogical facilities, and elaborated on their collections and the helpfulness, or lack thereof, of their staffs.

After lunch, Shirley spoke on church records. While we all seek out baptism, marriage, and burial records, there are many other useful church-related records and publications. However, to understand any church record it is necessary to understand the practices of the particular denomination that made the record, and Shirley pointed out a number of the most important of these practices. She also mentioned the unfortunate effects on church records of "man, mold, and church mouse."

I had to leave before the session on research facilities in the Great Lakes States, but I am told that it was equally instructive. After commenting on the facilities listed in her handout, she reminded her listeners that good research techniques are the keys to the success of a research trip, and she provided guidelines to follow.
