## **INCREASE IN** ANNUAL DUES

The Financial Committee has met several times to review our financial status. It was apparent that our income did not meet the normal operating expenses of the Society. Options were proposed in areas where we could cut expenses. One option was to not purchase anything over the normal dayto-day needs of the Society. Another was to not renew subscriptions to magazines. We also looked at giving up the Xerox (copy) machine, but we still have a contract for another two vears. We will address that again when it is due for renewal by comparing purchasing a smaller unit vs. renting. We are still in the process of reviewing an in-crease in our annex rental rates to organizations and companies that rent from us. A decision will be made on this shortly.

Because we need to meet our obligation to the Society, the Financial Committee recommended to the CCGS Board of Directors to increase our annual dues, effective March 1, 2009. The new dues schedule will be: Single membership - \$30.00; Joint membership - \$40.00; Single Life Membership -\$650.00; and Joint Life membership - \$800.00. This increase was ratified by the Society members who attended the General Meeting on February 24, 2009.

#### NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY Bill Whalley

What with nearly 50 volunteer librarians and a complex operation, it's hard to all stay on the same page. We decided to hold a Librarian's Seminar to get together, get to know one another, and discuss issues. It was a very successful meeting. Nearly half of the librarians were able to attend. We spent two hours and ran out of time before we ran out of things to discuss. We decided to meet again on a quarterly basis.

Here are some of the topics we covered and changes you might see.

Mike Finley volunteered to schedule library cleanup duties such as dusting, cleaning tables and restrooms, etc. He has created a schedule so the librarians know what needs to be done and when. I think the library looks spiffier already.

Kara Lynn Rankin created a phone log so that messages don't get lost in the shuffle. We do quite a bit of library work by phone and this will help us to keep a record and to follow up when needed.

We created a Class and Seminar Log for librarians to record who has signed up and who has paid. Instructors can gauge the class size. Accounting can monitor payments. Education can check class popularity. Librarians can give out up-to-date information to patrons. Yes, we used to do this, but stopped for some reason.

We heard about Annex renters complaining about low temperatures, and have asked the board to look into a solution (maybe a programmable thermostat?).

We are tooling up to have librarians call members to remind them of their membership expiration.

We covered a number of library issues: how to direct research requests; working alone, yes/no; updated forms and librarian's manual; authorizing and ordering supplies; selling surplus books; librarian scheduling; spring inventory and more.

Come in and chat with the librarians. I've found that each one has his or her own unique experience in genealogy and that I can pick up tips for my own research by just talking.

# BRITISH ISLES FOCUS GROUP Bill Whalley

Once a month, on the second Saturday from 10:30-12, we get together in the library to discuss British Isles research. It's not a class, but a free-form discussion with no set agenda. Attendance varies, with from one to four or five people showing up. We also have an on-line Google group for discussion and file and message sharing, but it doesn't get much action.

Some recent topics: An attendee was tracing her grandfather, who she knew was from England, maybe Blackburn. We found his name by tracing his son in the US census. We haven't gone back across the pond yet, but now we have a name and approximate birth date to work with.

Another attendee, involved in Scottish research, brought in a newsletter from a Scottish genealogy society he belongs to. It's amazing what you can publish if you have 4000 members. We also talked about my recent trip to Scotland and (afterwards) connecting with a Scottish 4th cousin.

Last meeting we talked about a couple's 17th century British ancestors and their US immigration. The US side is published, but British ancestors are not. Some of our CCGS library books on English emigrants were no help, so we talked about how to go about British Isles research in the LDS Salt Lake City library.
