NEWSPAPERS AVAILABLE ON MICROFILM LOCALLY!

Fort Vancouver Regional Library has the *Oregonian* from 1985 onward on microfilm at the main branch library, 1007 E. Mill Plain, Vancouver. The Multnomah County Library has it from December 4, 1850 onward. There is also an index card file for events of local significance at Portland. The microfilm of the *Oregonian* is only at Central Library, 801 SW 10th Avenue in Portland. The *Reflector* is available on film at the Battle Ground library beginning in 1909.

You can also see many newspapers at home via your computer, or at your nearby Vancouver library branch, if you don't have a computer at home. *The Columbian* is available from 1995 to present and the *Oregonian* from 1989 to present. They are on the library site, www.fvrl.org, click on Magazine & Research Databases; Connect to Databases; log in with your library card number & name; click on Proquest; Publication Search; C for *The Columbian* or O for *Oregonian* and you'll find them. MY FIRST TRIP TO SALT LAKE CITY

When I was growing up I always thought I had an unusual surname. I was always asked to spell it at least once when giving my name. A visit to the Family History Center Library proved me wrong. I found hundreds of listings of my surname in the Irish films with at least three additional spellings.

As a first time visitor to the Family History Library I was impressed by the number of films available, over 2.4 million, 825,000 microfiche, and 300,000 books. The library is equipped with 160 computers, 509 microfilm readers, and 46 microfiche readers. Also impressive is the number of people who visit the library each day. I saw a variety of ages and from all walks of life. At 8:00 a.m. each morning the line waiting to enter stretched down the block. The staff graciously greets the visitors and offers assistance, if needed.

The trip with the CCGS group was a positive learning adventure. The experienced veteran members of the group offered advice, direction, and hints on library procedure, the hotel routine and nearby restaurants. For a first time visit to the library and being new to the world of genealogy research I appreciated the advantages and camaraderie of going with the CCGS group.

JANE MILLER'S ANSWERS TO OCTOBER MEETING QUERIES

It was a pleasure to share information about Fort Vancouver Regional Library's Inter Library Loan resource at the October CCGS meeting. Thank you for all your kind comments and additional information. And what a great turnout! A couple of issues came up during the meeting that I was not prepared to address, so I'd like to do that now.

First, it was mentioned that patrons are limited to three film requests at a time. FVRL's ILL department supervisor assures me that FVRL does not place such restrictions on requests. What does often happen is the lending library has limits on not only how many items they will loan to each patron or each library at a time, but how long they will let us keep them and how they may be used. Some lending libraries send only one at a time, and others will send a dozen or more. It depends on their policy. Those restrictions are never ours but the lending library's. If you are being told that FVRL will not accept more than three requests at a time, you are receiving incorrect information.

The other comment touched on periodical requests by phone. Telephone Information does accept periodical requests. It is necessary, however, as I mentioned in my presentation, that you provide the right kind and enough information about the article you are seeking for us to obtain it for you. Also as mentioned, most libraries will not lend entire issues of periodicals. Therefore, we must have the title and author of the desired article, the name of the periodical, and the date and page numbers. With that detailed information, the lending library can copy the requested article and send it to you or FVRL. It is then yours to keep. FVRL is charged for the copy according to the lending library's policy. FVRL absorbs the cost up to \$10 per article. You must indicate on the yellow form your willingness and the amount to make up the difference if there is one. You will be contacted by FVRL and asked for the difference before the request is finalized. Please see the illustrations in the handout about the proper request formats.
