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

BLM Advises That Its Web Site Is Temporarily Inaccessible

You are currently unable to access the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) web site because of litigation against the Department of the Interior (DOI) regarding access to Indian trust data or assets.

On December 5, a court order from U.S. District Judge Royce C. Lambert required DOI and its agencies to disconnect from the Internet all information systems until it can be demonstrated that systems housing or providing access to individual Indian trust data or assets meet appropriate security standards.

We are currently reviewing all information systems and certifying to the court's satisfaction that all of BLM's computer systems protect all critical information. As a result, you cannot view the BLM's home page or send e-mail to DOI or its agencies.

We are working diligently to comply with the court order so that we can restore full service to our customers as soon as possible. Until that time, please telephone your local BLM office for assistance. We apologize for the inconvenience this presents.

Access to UK Census for 1901 Temporarily Withdrawn

The Public Record Office in England put the 1901 Census Records for all 32.5 million residents of Edwardian Britain on the web at <www.census.pro.gov.uk> on January 2. However, the demand so far exceeded expectations that access was quickly withdrawn while the system is upgraded to more adequately serve the demand.

For the first time a UK census (1901) has been released with an index of names. You will be able to access the index for free over the internet, and your editor understand it will give name, occupation, census place, and where born, but no folio number or relationship. For a fee, you will be able to view or obtain an image copy of the actual census page, which reveals additional information, including mental health. Every one of the handwritten census records was scanned. Though the index and census are not accessible at the site at the time of this writing, there is available a tour of the site that gives complete details on its use and on the fees that will apply. It is definitely worth a visit if you plan to make use of this census.

January Program Links History and Genealogy

At the January general meeting, Maryalice Gordon entertained and enlightened us with stories of how she came to appreciate the role of her husband's and her ancestors in the history of our country. Her talk was especially meaningful to me, since my husband and I had just returned from an Elderhostel in Panama, where we studied the history of the country and of the Panama Canal. We had with us a copy of an account by a man who crossed the Isthmus of Panama in the fall of 1849, before either the Panama Railroad or the Canal were built. He traveled at the same time as, and possibly in the company of, my great-grandfather Alanson Swain, as he refers in his narrative to a Mr. Swain of Nantucket. The story greatly interested our guides and some of our fellow-travelers.

OUR CCGS WEB PAGE(S)

Are you aware that CCGS actually has two web sites? Our second site is on Rootsweb and is linked to the main CCGS web page. It's possible you will never be aware of going from one to the other unless you couldn't get back to your starting point. That problem can be solved by always using the back key (or arrow) on your browser.

Our main site is at http://www.ccgs-wa.org. The site at has library information and contains the listings of our CCGS publications. I have both sites bookmarked in my Netscape browser.

You will find lots of convenient links for your use as you travel between the two sites. You can search out titles of books in our library with FreeFind from the home page of the main site. Key in part of the name of the title, the author, or



locality, and FreeFind will tell you which page it's on – even if it's on the Rootsweb site. All 160 CCGS pages are indexed by FreeFind!

We now have a "Help wanted!" section on our web page that is gradually being completed. Jobs that need chairpersons are listed with the description of the duties for that position. REMINDER: CCGS Links to Ancestry.com



It once took 15 months to hear back from another society. The continuity that Holly has given to this project is to be commended. In addition, when the Library Committee made up new Library Policies this past year, Holly was asked to contact all societies in Washington state and procure all material published by each of them. (She was surprised to find that not all societies publish.) We now have everything that was published up to the year 2000 from 5 of the 36 active societies in Washington State.

Holly is a quiet and very unassuming delightful person. I have enjoyed getting to know her and watch her quietly go about her very fruitful volunteer job. When you see her at our next genealogical function, stop and say "Hi" and let her know what a great job she is doing.
