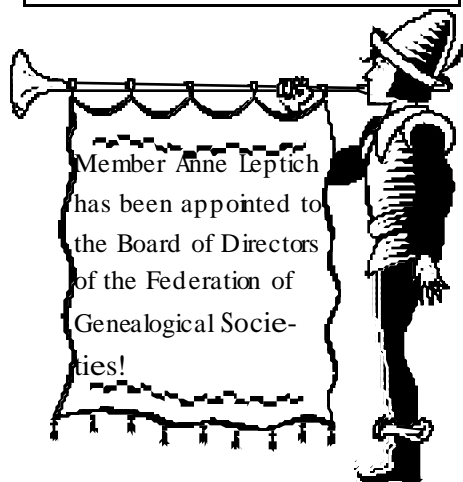

COME JOIN US ON THE INTERNET

At the March meeting, Pat Bauer and Gene Kuechmann will discuss and demonstrate some of the ways that computers and the Internet can contribute to your genealogical research. Ancestry.com has donated copies of the fall 2000 issue of Computer Genealogy, as well as catalogs, for distribution at the meeting.

Patricia McKee Bauer, CCGS Webmaster, has been using personal computers for about 12 years, and except for a one-day class, she is self-taught. She designed her first web page six years ago to advertise her book on reunion planning, and has since designed 25 or more pages that are currently active. She now creates web pages for CCGS members in exchange for a \$50 contribution to the Society. Several years ago Jennifer Petersen started the CCGS "chat room" and asked Pat to help. Nancy Petersen joined Pat as co-host when Jennifer could no longer continue. When Margaret Hepola donated an Internet computer for the CCGS Library, Pat was largely responsible for setting it up and getting it on line. As CCGS Webmaster she created and maintains our outstanding web site.

Gene Swain Kuechmann has taught the use of computers for a number of years to our beginning genealogy classes and helped found and direct the CCGS Computer Interest Group. She has a BA in mathematics and secondary education from the University of Tulsa and an MA in mathematics from UCLA. She studied computer science as part of her MA program, but like Pat is self-taught in the use of personal computers. Professionally, she has taught secondary school mathematics, written and edited educational and technical publications, consulted on the design and content of educational software, and co-authored a textbook on computer programming. She has also worked as a volunteer in the field of adaptive computing for individuals with disabilities.



NGS Conference in the States: 16-19 May 2001

We are quickly approaching "early" registration deadline! By 19 March 2001, less than a month from now, early registration fees are due. If we return our registration forms to NGS by that date we save \$25.00 for the four-day conference. Registration fee for NGS members is \$160.00 and for non-members is \$190.00. After 19 March 2001, the NGS member fee is \$185.00 and the non-member fee is \$215.00. Single-day registration is \$70.00 per day, regardless of NGS membership and regardless of time of registration.

NGS has arranged with Tri-Met that all paid registrants will have a letter pass that will allow conference attendees to ride the Max Train and busses in an expanded fareless square. (This is basically from the Lloyd Center to the Convention Center to Downtown. Downtown is already in fareless square.)

After clicking the title "NGS 2001 Conference in the States, Portland, Oregon," click on "Conference Schedule," then click on "Registration," and the registration form will appear. Fill in your choices and payment method. Bingo! You're registered!

In 1995 Alice discovered Internet genealogy. Her greatest achievement was finding her husband's Allen & associated lines, all Quaker, something her in-laws had failed to do in 30 plus years of searching. In 1996, while a member of a Kansas mailing list, she came upon the beginnings of the USGenWeb Project, and was off and running.

The following spring, at a Family History Center, Alice met Mary Katschke, who introduced her to CCGS. We are excited to welcome Alice Allen as our new Accessions Director for the Library. Alice says she is very excited to expand her "Volunteer Career" with CCGS.

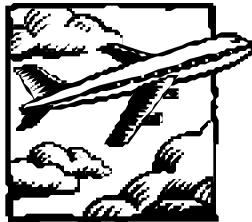

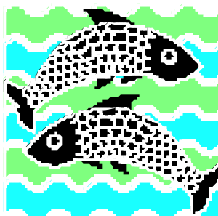

LET'S GO "FICHEING"!

It may not be like sitting on a grassy bank dangling your line in the pond, waiting for the fish to bite, but searching through microfiche for a lost ancestor is exciting when you catch one.



At the CCGS library we have a small collection of fiche – including Virginia Revolutionary Pension Applications, Swedish settlements on the Dela-ware, History of Union and Tolland County, Connecticut, California Marriage Index 1960-1981, Oregon Marriage Index 1961-1992; Index of Maryland Colonial Wills, and many other interesting titles.

Microfiche are just a sample of what is available for your research at the library. But if you haven't been on a "ficheing" trip, this is a great time because the weather is always perfect to search through the fiche.

Hi, CCGS computer users

The system for cataloging the CCGS Library holdings has been changed as of 1 February 2001. The new program is called "Library Manager". It's written in the Foxpro language.

As the programmer of the new system, I need help in two areas. I need one or more people who can program in Foxpro. I would like to have at least one person, and preferably more, who could maintain the programs, "just in case." Foxpro is basically DBASE, so familiarity with DBASE III or IV might also work, if you don't mind a little bit of learning.

Of more immediate importance, I am looking for someone with experience in setting up or maintaining a peer-to-peer network. The CCGS Library has three computers that were originally networked to share a printer. I have set up the network to enable updating the data files from the new system on all computers, under program control. Also, there is a system under program control to backup the data to a Zip disk. However, as it is currently set up, sometimes the network works and sometimes it doesn't. This means that I have to go to the Library every time any change is made to the files and ensure that the files on all computers are updated and that the backup is accomplished. I don't mind this, but I feel a simple fix to the network should eliminate the problem – I just need help figuring it out.

I would appreciate any help that anyone with experience in this area could provide. There must be someone out there. If you could be of help, please email me. For the network person, I expect that once it's set up correctly, no more involvement would be necessary, other than perhaps a question occasionally from me.
