Getting to know. . . Charles & Marian (Groth) Thompson



Chuck and I both grew up in the Vancouver area. He attended Vancouver High School and I went to Evergreen High School. Just out of high school Chuck joined the Air National Guard at the Portland Air Base. We met through my cousin, who was Chuck's best friend, and started dating. After a few months, Chuck's Guard unit was called to active duty. This was at the beginning of the Korean Conflict. He asked me to wait for him and shipped out, eventually ending up on St. Lawrence Island off the coast of Alaska. This was to be a year's tour of duty, a long time from a teen's point of view.

A little over a year later we were married, during a two-week furlough, on June 20, 1952. We started our life together at Larsen Air Force Base, Moses

Lake, Washington. When Chuck's enlistment was up, we moved back to the Vancouver area where he found work, but he was never content with the jobs. His training was in mechanics, and he really enjoyed the Guard, where he worked in the motor pool. So after a couple of years he joined the Air Guard again and went to work as a civilian employee in the motor pool. In the meantime, we started our family; a son was born on August 28, 1954, and just over a year later on October 8, 1955, our daughter joined the family. I was a stay-at-home wife and mother; however I did volunteer work at the grade schools our children were attending and managed to find many things to bring in extra money.

When our children were in their last years of high school and starting college, I took up oil painting. I joined the Society of Washington Artists, and after a 25-year membership I became a life member. Later I changed to watercolor and then to colored pencils. Next, I found myself learning to quilt. I still do quilting and hope someday to go back to painting. Then along came genealogy, one more hobby I really love. I guess I just love playing.

Our interest in genealogy began when Chuck's aunt talked to us about his great-grandfather, Charles McKay, who had lived at Friday Harbor, San Juan Island. He was a blacksmith of Scotch ancestry and a very hardy person who worked at his trade up until just a few months of his passing at the age of ninety. Chuck's aunt gave him a hand-written journal McKay had kept when he first came to Washington Territory. His wife, who seems to be a dead end in Chuck's research, was half Indian with the last name Enis/Inis/Ennis. We began to look up things about Chuck's family, and during the Clark County Fair in August of 1996, we stopped at the booth of the Clark County Genealogy Society and talked to the representatives there, took an application blank, filled it out, and received our membership packet. From that time forward it's been one happy road, searching our family ancestors. On January 30, 1998, we became Life Members of the Society, knowing full well we were hooked and would never give up this hobby. Other names in Chuck's ancestry are: Baughman, Thompson (Tonness), Huckins. The surnames I'm researching are: Groth, Ellithorpe, Ball, Slater, Griffith, and Sanders, plus a few more from way back.

As members of the Clark County Genealogy Society, we have made about seven trips to Salt Lake City with the group to research in the Family History Library, something we would highly recommend everyone to do if they can. We have also volunteered as Librarians in the CCGS Library for quite a few years. Five or six years ago we joined the Genealogy Forum of Oregon, and hope to spend more time researching in their library. Chuck retired from the Air Guard and his job in 1985 after 33 years service. We are now in our 59th year of marriage, having just the two children, six grandchildren, twelve great-grandchildren, and in the spring we will have our first great-great-grandchild. We have now completely retired to Woodland, Washington, and fill our days doing all the fun things we can think of, like researching on Ancestry.com or RVing when we can.

Dennis "Doc" and Carol Clark and Bill Whalley are being recognized by the Washington Genealogical Society for their significant contributions to CCGS.



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Getting to Know. . . .Lillian McDonough Fullerton



Write my life story in ten minutes? That was the assignment that Lethene Parks gave her students in her CCGS genealogy writing class. I took the challenge, and the following is my story:

I was born in San Francisco and grew up in Ruch, Jackson County, Oregon, on the homestead farm of my grandparents, James and Lillie (Smith) McDonough. My parents, Ivan and Inez (Willits) McDonough, moved back to Oregon to care for the farm after my grandfather passed away. My work experience, outside of farm chores, included helping in my uncles' country store. I learned to dip ice cream for cones, pump gas, slice bologna, and help with general store duties. After graduating from Ashland High School, I worked as a telephone operator before the introduction of direct dial. I also spent time as a bank teller before starting a family.

My college years started late in my life. I graduated with an A.A. in Dental Hygiene from Clark College in 1972 and spent the next 28 years as a dental hygienist. In 2000, the year I retired, I fulfilled an education goal of mine by completing a B.S. degree from Eastern Washington University. I have lived in Vancouver, Washington, for the past fifty-four years. Special people in my life are my four daughters, two sons-in-law, two grandchildren, two step-grandchildren, and two step-greatgrandchildren.

My interest in genealogy began with a letter I obtained from a cousin, written in 1888 to my grandfather in Oregon. The letter was written in County Mayo, Ireland, by my great-grandmother and signed only "I remain your loving mother until death." It was an adventure searching for her name and family in Ireland. Using connections made locally, through the Internet, and on two adventurous trips to Ireland, I found my grandmother's name, Bridget McDonough. My daughter and I visited the family's original homestead and met charming relatives who live in the same small town as our ancestors. I am also researching my Smith, Wrisley, and Willits ancestors, all Oregon pioneer families.

Volunteering as Librarian in the CCGS Library gives me a great appreciation of the information available to the researchers and volunteers. I learn something new each day and add more to my list of things I want to learn.

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CCGS Salt Lake City Wrap-Up
