



This year the annual, all day, JCGS seminar will feature Beverly Rice talking about "Missing Pieces". Ms. Rice is an associate of PastTracker Association Genealogical Services and a Certified GenealogistSM (CGSM). She was a recent speaker at the Oregon State Genealogical Conference in Salem, Oregon. She will talk about "Missing Pieces"—solving your family puzzles by developing timelines, discovering the occupations of your ancestors and using courthouse records. There will also be a special feature on "Continuing Educational Opportunities".

The cost of the all day program will be \$25 if you register before March 12, 2006. After that date the cost will be \$30.00. A cut-out sign-up sheet is on page 10 of this newsletter.

To bring together persons who are researching family history and to promote fellowship and cooperation among them;



To foster, stimulate, and share ideas, information, methods and practices in family research;

March Annual JCGS Seminar—"Missing Pieces". See article on page 1 and registration form on page 10

April—Dr. Alan H. Rowberg will give a presentation to the Society on Saturday, April 10 at 9:30 AM at the Tri Area Community Center, in Chimacum. The topic will be "**Heritage Photos: Scanning, Restoring, Preserving and Publishing.**" Dr. Rowberg is a computer programmer who specialized in digital images. He is of Norwegian heritage and lives in Shoreline with his wife, Bonnie Jean MacDonald, a professional genealogist. Together they have traveled around the country meeting family and researching their family history.

May: "**Taxes Aren't Always the Bane of Our Existence.**" A less often used resource available to the genealogist is tax records — particularly in early years. They can substitute for census to confirm location; they can help pinpoint age and possibly familial relationships; they can tell you when an ancestor died or moved away; they might give you occupations, relative wealth or marital status; and, there are often hidden gems. Come learn about Jesse Stewart's experience using tax records and see if they might not be useful to you!

history—with special emphasis on research data concerning past and present families in Jefferson County, Washington;

To encourage those officials in charge of public records and genealogical collections to preserve and make them accessible to interested persons.

In brief, JCGS is to provide support to our members in conducting their research, within and outside of Jefferson County; to collect data on Jefferson County residents, for both members and non-members alike; and to act as a voice for our members with government officials to ensure that genealogical records are available to the public.

The first two objectives are the most important on an on-going basis—and probably higher on the list of priorities of our members. In order to achieve these goals, your Society is working on the following programs and projects in 2006 and beyond:

Support for JCGS Members

The people involved with JCGS are the Society's greatest asset to members—both people at the January meeting and others through the years have stated that they learn a lot from other members and like the sharing of information and "how-to's". We evidently are a sociable group, which is appreciated as long as we can "get down to business" too!

Many of us have learned more from informal discussions with other members of JCGS than we ever would from reading books. We've been helped with suggestions for extra steps to take and where we might find needed information. We hope you have the same opportunity to glean some things from the wealth of information available through JCGS members.

Membership Meetings There was some feedback that the room set-up, visibility and audibility could use improvement. We are somewhat limited due to the room configuration, but have purchased a lapel microphone, a large screen and a projector for computer images this year. We expect that these purchases will increase visibility and make it easier to hear the presenter. Content of the meetings is important. You want a chance to learn something. So, our program committee is busy lining up speakers and topics (some of which came from your great suggestions) which will prove both educational and entertaining. The seminar in March, "Missing Pieces" should be very informative (see related article) and our upcoming meetings include "Preserving and Using Family Photos" (April), "Using Tax Records" (May), "Genealogical Resources Close to Home (June), and hopefully using newspapers and European research later in the year.

Resource Corners These semi-formal meetings (last Saturday of each month) are designed to allow an in-depth look at an area of genealogical research. One of our members generally leads the discussion, but participants are encouraged to bring their own experiences, questions and problems related to the topic. We received some wonderful suggestions for future topics, and will incorporate them during the year.

Discussion Groups Currently we have two discussion groups going: Southern Group and Researching in the Midwest. These are definitely informal get-togethers so that people who are researching in the same area can share insights into the peculiarities of the region and new resources they have found. Feedback from some of you suggested that these meetings often get off track and are not as productive as you would like. Others felt that these meetings were good opportunities for them to learn from others. So, a bit of a conundrum! We have re-evaluated our offerings regarding discussion groups and have made some changes which we think you will like. See the article in "Spring Calendar Details" on the next page.

Library The Library is viewed as a valuable asset by both members and the Executive Committee. We are very proud of the growth of our collection of books, CDs, audio cassettes and other materials in the Library and the fact that we can provide many on-line resources to our members. The Society's goal is to continue to grow our collection—to that end we have budgeted \$1000 for the purchase of materials in 2006. And, we look to you to participate in increasing our holdings through our 50/50 program (where you select a book, and if approved by the Library Committee, you pay half and the Society pays half), donations of books you no longer need at home, and donations to our book fund at member-meetings.

Some feel that the Research Center hours do not meet their schedules well. Suggestions were made about having more flexible hours, longer hours and/or member-only hours. Currently we are open Tuesday-Saturday, 11 AM to 4 PM. We've scheduled some of our discussion groups for different days and times than the normal Research Center "business hours" and we're initiating a Members' Day once each quarter so that you can come and get special help with your research. Another suggestion was to do book reviews of new additions to our collection. Anyone out there want to

New Treasurer

Last May, Sandy Smith boldly stepped forward and offered to help the Society by taking on the Treasurer's position. She jumped right in and helped re-organize our banking, found insurance for the Society and recommended many procedural changes. Unfortunately, Sandy found that her other commitments were too great and decided to step down as our Treasurer. We thank her very much for her efforts.

Vicki Davis has agreed to take over the Treasurer duties, at least until May when we will have our next election. We welcome Vicki and her great organizational and financial skills. Thank you, Vicki, for taking on this important role.

At the January meeting you gave us ideas for what you would like to see in the educational programs. We have added groups and expanded the times when the Research Center will be open. Please let us know what works and what doesn't. This is a work in progress.

Regional Research Discussion Group: a monthly discussion group aimed at helping members with their research within the United States. The regional focus of this group will change as interest dictates. March will focus on the Andersonville Prison in Georgia. The topics for April and May will be determined by the group. It is an opportunity to see who else is researching in your area, as well as to share books and research tips that relate to the geographic area. This group will meet the third Friday of the month at 10:00 AM.

Brick Walls Discussion Groups: This group will give members a chance to present their research problems to get feedback from the group on ways to break through the brick wall. Members will take turns making presentations. When it is their turn, they will give a summary of the research completed and a statement of what they want to accomplish. Everyone will then have a chance to contribute to the solution to the puzzle. It is possible to participate in the group without presenting your research for review, but discussion will be focused on the problem presented. This group will meet on the second Monday of each month at 1:30 PM. Since the Center is usually closed on Mondays, it will be an additional time for members to use the Library. We will be able to stay and do research until 4:00 PM.

Writing Your Family History Discussion Group: Many have expressed an interest in presenting their research in some form other than charts. There are many options such as narrative, fiction, or journal format. This group will be a chance to talk about how to accomplish this goal. Those who have tried their hand will share what they have learned. This group will meet the first Wednesday of the month at 6:30 PM at the Research Center. We will not start the group until we have more daylight in May. We can arrange car pools for those who prefer not to drive in the evening.

Resource Corner: A specific topic will be covered each month. Although this is not a formal class, the discussion leader will start the conversation and see that the designated topic is adequately explored. This is an opportunity for us to focus on one area of genealogical research strengthening our skills by sharing our wisdom. Let us know what topics you would like to cover. We will try to include a computer related topic each quarter. In March, Eileen Martin will explain the various resources available to us through our local Family History Center. This is an underused resource in our own back yard. In April, Jesse Stewart will share tips on how to successfully search out your ancestors on Ancestry.com. There are tricks that help find all that is available on the online subscription site. In May, Bev Brice will talk about how to get started researching in Europe. This discussion will apply equally to families in the 1600s or in the 1900s.

Member Day: We want to invite our members to come into the Research Center for one-on-one assistance with your research. We will have extra volunteers on hand to help. Please bring pedigree charts and/or family group sheets for the families you are interested in discussing. This special event will happen once a quarter on a second Saturday.

Retrieving Data on Jefferson County Residents and Making it Available to Researchers

The Research Committee was very busy in 2005 collecting church records from the Baptist and Presbyterian Churches and walking cemeteries to update our listings of burials. We are slowly making our way through these records to get them in a form that can be shared with researchers. For 2006, our plans are to update our funeral home records, complete our cemetery updates and to obtain more church records.

How You Can Help JCGS

Since we weren't able to touch on all aspects of JCGS at either the Executive Committee workshop or the membership meeting, and since many of you were not able to attend the membership meeting, we ask that you all keep the suggestions coming! Simply touch base with one of the Executive Committee members (Jesse Stewart, Eunice Franklin, Mimi Starks, Vicki Davis, Bev Brice, Lora Eccles, Eileen Martin, Carrie Wooten, Tom Berg or Marge Samuelson) and share your thoughts and ideas.

Additionally, we are always looking for volunteers. Now, we know that your initial reaction may be that you can't make the commitment required to volunteer. But, rest assured, we have a variety of things to do. Some require only a few hours of your time on a particular day, some can be done at your own pace either at home or at the Research Center, and some are on-going projects or efforts that might require a greater commitment.

We currently have the following volunteer opportunities available:

- **Cemetery walk-throughs:** this is to update our cemetery listings, and usually requires only 1 day of your time. You would join others and walk the rows in the cemetery making additions or corrections to our list. Contact: Eileen Martin. 385-0673
- **Data collection:** we will be visiting Kosec Funeral Home (Probably 1 day's effort) and churches during the year to collect data. Sometimes this may require transcribing the official records, sometimes it involves only making copies. Contact: Lora Eccles 344-4860
- **Data entry:** after we have collected data, we need to enter it into a database. Data entry requires rudimentary typing skills and no real computer expertise (the database is already set up for data entry). We don't put a timetable on completion, so you can work at your own pace, either at home or at the Research Center. Contact Bev Brice 385-6599
- **Proof reading:** Once the data has been entered, we need folks who are pretty good a detail work to proof read the data against the original documents. This can be a individual or

team effort. Contact: Bev Brice 385-6599

- **Computer volunteers:** we need help maintaining and installing our databases in FileMakerPro. This is an on-going but sporadic effort. Contact: Bev Brice 385-6599
- **Events Coordinator:** this “job” would focus on events to be held at the Research Center—discussion groups, resource corners and “special” events. The coordinator, working with the Librarian, would select topics, find discussion leaders, submit information for the newsletter, and send out reminders about events. Contact Bev Brice 385-6599
- **Research Trip Coordinator:** every two months the Society “sponsors” research trips to local resource centers (public libraries, private libraries and other genealogy society libraries) to assist members in locating information on their families. The coordinator determines the schedule, submits the schedule to the newsletter editor, and coordinates the actual trip. Although there is a regular timetable, the effort is not extensive (and, it’s a good way to help you get out to other libraries if you want to!). Contact: Jesse Stewart 437-8103
- **Committee membership:** we are always looking for “new blood” on our committees. Each committee meets every other month to plan and schedule upcoming events and make recommendations for new programs to the Executive Committee. Our standing committees are Library, Program, and Research. We also have short-term committees such as the audit (annual review of our procedures) and nominating (finding candidates for open officer positions) committees. Contact: Jesse Stewart 437-8103
- **Publicity:** we feel that we need to get the word about JCGS out better. We’d love to have someone who can work with local newspapers and other outlets to inform the community about JCGS. Contact: Jesse Stewart 437-8103
- **Research Center Volunteer:** we can always use additional people to “work” at the Research Center. JCGS is responsible for staffing the Center during open hours (Tuesday through Saturday, 11AM to 4 PM). The job is to help people who come in to research (either genealogical or historical research). There is a training period of 4 days (usually on Saturdays, but we can be flexible), then you’d be incorporated into the schedule. You would be working with at least one other JCGS volunteer, and you can commit to as few as 1 day a month or as much as one day each week. It’s up to you. Contact: Bev Brice 385-6599
- **Society Officer:** there are five elected positions within JCGS—President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary. This May, the positions of Recording Secretary and President will be up for election as regularly scheduled; additionally, we will need to elect a Vice President (to fill the vacancy created when Jesse Stewart assumed the Presidency last fall) and, possibly, a Treasurer.
