PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow EGS Members,

As we begin a new year, I would like to offer several ideas regarding how our organization may want to adapt to some of the changes we are facing in today's internet driven world of genealogical research. The inspiration for these ideas is an article published in FGS Forum, Fall 2007, Volume 19 Number 3, entitled "Societies Going Virtual" by David E. Rencher, former president, Federation of Genealogical Societies.

A challenge facing our organization currently is that today's information landscape - both free and fee based internet information resources - is erasing the need for and attractiveness of traditional genealogical societies, such as ours. The evidence in our case is decreasing membership, declining book sales, underutilized library research assistance, and fewer members who are actively involved in the affairs of our organization. I'm not saying that this is all due to the increased availability of internet resources, but I certainly believe it has been a significant factor.

So a question for us is what do we want to consider changing (if anything, I suppose) to adapt to the changing information landscape? How can we be the most relevant to our membership and the community we serve? What do we want to look like as an organization, two to three years down the road? There are many "right" answers to this question, of course, and it will be important to hear the different points of view from all of our members.

First of all, I think we need to leverage those services that are unique and/or complement the changing information landscape. In other words, those things that we do that are independent of internet resources, but dependent upon people to people contact and personal relationships. Examples include our very popular special interest groups (SIGs), our high quality monthly speakers and programs, and our electronic newsletter. Two of the three rely on personal contact and relationships that the internet cannot match. And our electronic newsletter compliments the changing information landscape with unique reports and links to the internet.

Secondly, we should take advantage of the new technologies, and consider changes to our offerings that make sense and can be supported. For example: an on-line research help capability (for both members and non-members); downloadable podcasts of our monthly programs; possibly redesign and update our website so that it can be both a research tool and research database for data unique to our area (Eastside cemetery data bases, for example); and sponsor/support a

newsgroup for members only, where questions can be asked online, and information exchanged. Some of these can be fee based for non-members.

None of these changes will be successful without the strong support of our members, of course. We will need to identify skill sets necessary to support any changes. These include technical skills, project management skills, and of course the necessary funding. We may not have the skills and/or scale to do these things. An option is to merge some of our resources with other societies in the region so that jointly we can offer more to the communities we serve. Perhaps we should have town hall meetings to explore these ideas further and build support. I offer these ideas as food for thought as we begin 2008. Although most of us are probably very comfortable with the organization as it operates today, we need to protect against becoming irrelevant as the world around us changes. I will be interested in your comments, and feedback from the board.

Finally, contrary to my earlier announcement of stepping down early as president, I have agreed to stay on as president through the end of my term in May, and am interested in working on whatever changes are supported by the membership going forward.

Eastside Genealogy Society Board Meeting Minutes of October 4, 2007. Held at Redmond Regional Library.

Present: Norb Ziegler, Bob Barnes, Judy Meredith, Sharron Filer, Dorothy Mehrer, Dave Abernathy, Walta McCarley, Sarah Fleming.

- •A decision was made to publish the minutes in the bulletin after approval at the subsequent board meeting.
- •It was noted that a memorial service will be held for Gene Faberberg, former EGS President, on November 4th at 1 p.m. at Anthony's Home Port Restaurant at Shilshole Bay, Seattle.
- •Sarah Fleming gave a report of the book acquisition committee, including a brief history of the committee. The books were stored in a couple of different places before being located at the Regional Library. Guidelines were given in November 1994 and the first committee meeting was held December 1994. Three of the original members are still active. The committee purchases books with suggestions from SIGS and the membership. Older editions go into circulation. The genealogy section is available to other branches but not for interlibrary usage. Auburn, WA has a big collection of genealogy materials. Memorial money is given to the book committee to purchase a book in the name of the deceased member. CDs are not purchased. At first CDs were available but they are too hard to keep. Seattle Public Library has given theirs to the Seattle Genealogy Society. There are currently 8 members and a library liai-

son. The committee meets 3 – 4 times a year. The book acquisition committee did not order all the books they planned last year, but approximately \$400 were ordered and have not yet been paid for. The board made the decision that the bill from last year will be paid against this year's budget and treated as a budget variance. The books from last year that were not purchased can be ordered up to the total amount budgeted this year. If money becomes available later in the year, additional purchases may be approved. Sarah will send a committee report to the board. The committee's next meeting will be at the Bellevue Main Library Saturday, December 1st in room 4.

- •Discussion about positions still open and procedures to do election of officers.
- •By-laws discussion continues. Bob and Dave are working on ways to go forward. Report at next board meeting.
- •Skagit Valley Genealogical Society Heritage Fair Book Sale Saturday Oct. 6th - Bob and Judy will sell books at this event.
- •Family History Expo November 10th. A few SIGSs have signed up to participate.
- •SIGS report. Dave has resigned from the computer SIG. He will continue as SIG representative unless the groups wish to select another person. The November meeting will be on Legacy 7.
- •Newsletter update: Barbara Zanzig is doing the October and November bulletins and Kim Nichols will start in January. Thank you, Pat for all the years and hard work you have done on this project.
- •Membership Dorothy reported there are 288 memberships with 306 individuals.
- •Website Task Force surveys were received but figure they came from current users and may not be a true picture. Dave spoke about the surname file for the internet. It would contain name only so there would be no privacy issue. The contact information would be generic and someone with the right access would forward requests to the "card" person. Dave and Bob also spoke about having a library book list and an interactive calendar on the



site. The committee met September 24th. If you have any input, please contact Kim Nichols.

EGS BOOK ACQUISITION COMMITTEE

What does the EGS Book Acquisition Committee do? We purchase books on your behalf for the Bellevue Regional Library (BRL) genealogy collection. We also accept appropriate book donations from you. BRL will not accept family histories or books on specific counties, except Washington State counties or eastern counties through which lots of people passed. If you have suggestions for books to add to the collection or books you would like to donate, please contact one of the committee members listed below.

The original BRL genealogy collection was very small. In October 1994 EGS worked out an agreement with BRL to donate our existing library, which was mainly in storage with a few books at the Lake Hills Library, and to purchase books to build the collection. The first book committee meeting was in December 1994 with Margery Perdue as chair. Margery served as chair until November 2002 when Carl Cason and Sarah Fleming became co-chairs. Current committee members are Mary Anagnost, Carl Cason, Marty Gale, Barbara Guyll, Margery Perdue, Winnie Sihon, Sarah Fleming, and Gayle McGlenn, BRL liaison.

EGS has added approximately 900 books to the BRL genealogy collection. Some of these books are in memory of deceased members. You, the EGS membership, can be proud of our contributions. If you have not used the collection in a while, you just might find something that will advance your research.

For the first few years, the committee concentrated on building a good basic collection. We tried to find something on each state and on countries of primary interest to the membership. We bought newly published or reprinted books of merit. We took suggestions from the membership, the special interest groups, and the interli-

brary loan librarian. More recently we have bought some multi-volume sets, e.g., The Great Migration series. We keep trying to fill in the gaps in the collection. We do not buy CDs because BRL circulates all their CDs.

The South King County Genealogical Society buys books for the Auburn Library. The BRL and Auburn collections complement each other, i.e., a good many books are unique to one of the collections. You have easy access to Auburn's books. Just ask a reference librarian to request books to be sent to the branch of your choice. (Submitted by Sarah Fleming, Book Acquisition Co-Chair)

A VARIETY OF QUESTIONS - PART 2 LOCATING ALTERNATE SOURCES OR HOW TO FIND WHICH RECORDS SHOULD BE SEARCHED IN AN ANCESTOR'S DISTANT LOCALITY

The original DearMYRTLE blog entry titled *A* variety of questions - Part 1 includes comments from an overwhelmed researcher who states:

"I need to figure out how to find ancestry in places like Pennsylvania [...]. I also have Qs about how to find records in different lands whether for Ireland, Scotland, England, France, Germany, Switzerland, and perhaps other countries as well once I clear up all the conundrums I'm still experiencing in tracing all the branches of my family in America. Last but not least, I know that some of the original records of my family were destroyed due to fires, like the Great Earthquake & Fire of San Francisco, California in 1905, or the U.S. Federal Census of 1890, or home fires where important correspondence and other documentation were stored from the 1880s onward. How do I recreate these wheels from just a scrap of a letter [circa] 1900 to find the records that were gathered and lost in the fire?"

To this Ol' Myrt here replies: What seems like a lost cause isn't – you just haven't uncovered a solution YET. THERE IS NO "WHOLE EARTH CATALOG" OF ALL BIRTH, MARRIAGE & DEATH RECORDS. Researchers must acknowledge several common misconceptions:

- ► You can find anything you want on the web. (It isn't all there yet.)
 - ► The Family History Library has filmed eve-

► The Library of Congress owns a copy of every book that was ever printed in the US. (It doesn't.)

One great exception to this "whole" approach is a project of benefit to researchers with ancestors of 1812, but legislation proposed for one of my friend Barb decision to provide indexes and scanned images of the following records, mostly on a pay-per view basis: Scotland census (1841-1901), church (1553-1854 births, baptisms, banns and marriages), vital records (birth 1855-1906, marriages 1855-1931, deaths 1855-1956), wills and testaments (1513-1901 when he did not find an approach widows. An ancestor may of 1812, but legislation proposed brought about until 1878.

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Challenges When Locating Records

The rules are different there. Researchers are most likely familiar with the court system and vital records offices in their own localities, but rules vary from place to place. One cannot assume that because the state of Washington keeps older records in regional records centers that the same will be true when looking for earlier generations in the state of Montana or the Dakotas.

Each state in the U.S. has different record groups, based on requirements imposed by the state legislature, the court system, and the division of jurisdiction. For instance, New England states have counties, but detailed birth, marriage & death records are typically kept on the town level. Virginia has several cities including Alexandria that are not part of a county. Instead of counties, Louisiana has parishes.

Diversity among record collections is further complicated by the passage of time, the requirements of the governing body and definitions of words at the time the record was created. There were the original 13 colonies before they became states. So-called western states were territories before they became states. Territorial records proved useful when researching my Caucasian British & Danish immigrant ancestors in Utah, but many territorial records in Oklahoma concern Native Americans.

Laws change over time. Immigration law has changed through the years, permitting wives to be automatically naturalized with their husbands, and later requiring them to file separately. In this case, even the name of the federal agency governing immigration has changed from the once familiar Immigration & Naturalization Service to the U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Services. For a synopsis, see the USCIS' Legislation from 1790-

1900, a 5-page .PDF document.

In the US, federal law enacted by Congress granted certain rights to war veterans, and later to widows. An ancestor may have served in the War of 1812, but legislation providing pension benefits for one of my friend Barb's ancestors wasn't brought about until 1878.

Errors in deductive reasoning cloud research, particularly when using a heretofore unfamiliar record group for the first time. A newbie researcher Ol' Myrt worked with was discouraged when he did not find an ancestor in War of 1812 pension files despite a strong family tradition of service. Further study proved the matter quite simply reflects the fact that the gentleman in question died before pension benefits were provided. Pension files are not comprehensive lists of all who served, but merely those who survived and chose to make application.

Church records pre-date the keeping of public vital records in most localities throughout the world. Some churches were great record keepers, others were not. Survival of old parish records from tiny towns in Lincolnshire, England depended on freedom from natural disasters and financial resources to fix leaky roofs and the like. For some of my research I've had to rely on the secondary records known as BTS or Bishop's Transcripts which were the annual reports that were hand-copied and submitted by the local priest. These have survived quite simply because they were housed in the distant diocese office.

I have also made mistakes in church record research, being unaware of the variety of churches from various denominations in the area at the time my ancestor was living. While it seemed logical to search Church of England and Society of Friends records, I didn't make progress until I looked at Methodist records that included the following subgroups in my research: Primitive Methodist, Wesleyan Methodist, Methodist New Connexion and United Methodist Church. Also in the area in 1847 was the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Who knew? Well, Ol' Myrt sure should have known and I do now. If you wish to make progress climbing your family tree, YOU will become an expert on the area where your ancestor once lived
