
ABOUT THE PROGRAM

SUMMARY OF THE MARCH MEETING

Darlene Hamilton is the Senior Genealogy Librarian at the Central Seattle Public Library where she has happily worked for thirty five years. In her presentation she gave an overview of the new library facilities and how to use the genealogy collection there. She gave some guidelines for any library research with particular emphasis on significant data bases.

The new downtown library is easiest to access by bus, as parking is expensive and limited. When you arrive at the library, take the elevator to the 9th floor. Get a copy of one of their guides to genealogy call numbers. The genealogy collection includes county histories; courthouse, cemetery, church, census, and military records; family histories; periodicals; and microfilm. There are more than 40,000 books, the largest collection west of the Mississippi and north of San Francisco.

Before you come, review what you have and which questions you need to work on, along with any necessary data and supplies you need to have

with you. She highly recommends forming a bibliography from the online catalog before your trip. The Seattle Public Library website is www. spl.org. Do your search by "SUBJECT BEGINS WITH ... " first and then keyword "TITLE CON-TAINS". Use the Surname followed by family such as "Smith family" for Family histories. For Geographic materials use the keyword "SUBJECT CONTAINS" and spell out the state name. Do a second search with the state name abbreviated. So you would search "King County, Washington" and "King County, Wash." Be alert Ronald Reagan dedicated himself to the spread to which abbreviation is used for the state you are looking for. She reminded us that many library catalogs are online and they are helpful in

preparing a bibliography. Sometimes the local library in the area of your research will have the best information and some may even be online.

The databases at SPL are Ancestry, Heritage Quest, and New England Ancestors. King County Public Library also gets the first two, but New England Ancestors are the publications of New England Historic Genealogic Society and the SPL librarians can give you access to this database. Since each database is

compiled separately, sometimes one will have a better picture or index than another. Genealogy classes are also taught at Seattle Public.

Not only did Darlene Hamilton encourage all tion. of us to utilize the SPL resources, she gave some general guides for library research and a valuable list of helpful websites.

COMPUTER SIG

There are many genealogy computer programs out there and most EGS members use one or more of the popular ones like PAF, Family Tree Maker or Legacy. Another program, albeit with a smaller user base, is "The Master Genealogist (TMG)" which is considered the "Cadillac" of genealogy programs since it is said to be able to deal with just about everything

imaginable. As a result it is on the expensive end of genealogy software and has a reputation for being more complicated.

About five years ago I learned about serious genealogy and I've been hooked. I have been serving as your secretary these past two

SURNAME FORUMS

The surname forums on the internet at Ancestry.com, Genealogy.com , and others can be a marvelous source to break through the brick walls of your research and meet new relatives. What's more, you do not need to be a member to use them.

Through the contacts I've made, I have received copies of marriage licenses, wills, deeds, and photographs of relatives and tombstones.

Can't find a surname board for the name you are researching? Try a different spelling or start a new board. Found a surname board, but no reference to your person of interest? Don't hesitate to post your own message - there may be someone just waiting for someone else to post.

Here are some hints to get the most from your post. First, look at a few of the other posts on the site. With hundreds of postings on some sites, how interested would you be in viewing those with subjects such as "Need help," "Can't find my ancestor," "Searching for gggrandfather"? The best subject lines include a name, place and approximate year, "John Doe, PA c1830." Second, give as much information as you can. Don't know his parents or where he was born? How about siblings, wife's name, children's names, places he lived, married, died? Someone, somewhere, may be researching John Doe's wife or brother and have the information you are looking for.

After discovering four other researchers of Means ancestors, we began a group e-mail so everyone could share the same discoveries and not repeat someone else's research. We also shared a site at MyFamily.com.

Within the surname forums, there is a search feature. You can enter a search for a name, place or other word within a particular surname forum or all forums.

This feature can take you to a post with a subject line you may pass over. "Jane White, 1800's" may mean nothing to you, but the post may reveal that Jane White's brother was your John Doe. Besides the surname forums, there are locality and topic forums to explore.

I hope you are as successful in filling in the blanks of your research as I have been. [Submitted by EGS member and Trustee, Sharron Crossan Filer]

FIND A LIBRARY CATALOG ONLINE

Looking for a library? - or then again, are you looking for an online library catalog? At Vanderbilt University's lib-web-cats website, you can find all kinds of them. You can browse by locality, or search by city, county, state, library type or combination of those terms. The following is from the website itself:

lib-web-cats is a directory of libraries worldwide. While the majority of the current listings are in North America, the number of libraries represented in other parts of the globe is growing. Each listing includes links to the library's website and online catalog. Other information available includes the geographic location, address, library type, current and previous library automation systems used, and the size of the library's collection.

I searched for library catalogs for "Seattle" and got 47 hits. Being from Orting, Washington, I then searched the catalog of the Seattle Public Library for the word "Orting." I found that they have 10 items which include the term "Orting." One of those turned out to be Orting, Washington. Red Cross Auxiliary members and minutes, 1916-1919." Considering all the local history research I've done in the Orting area, I still didn't know that this resource existed.

EGS SCANDINAVIAN INTEREST GROUP MEETING SUMMARY, TUESDAY, MARCH 14, 2006

In June 2002 Mort and Lois Wahlin cruised and toured the coast of Norway, in part to see the city of Kristiansund where Mort's grandmother came from. Mort treated us to a showing of their trip videos, which he has nicely gathered into a pair of DVD's using his Magic Macintosh. Mort found that the Regional Archives, where we meet, had obtained a DVD player and connected it via the PC to the overhead projector, and the whole setup worked very well.

The Wahlins started in London, then made their way to Dover where they boarded the cruise ship Norwegian Dream and embarked on a cruise through the North Sea and the Norwegian Sea to the North Cape (Nordkapp) and back down the coast to Bergen and Stavanger. On the way north the ship entered Sognefjord. Near the inner end of Sognefjord at the little port of Flåm they took a cog railway tour up the mountain to the rail junction at Myrdal. The ship's next waypoint northbound was Trondheim with its Nidaros Cathedral, where royal coronations and marriages take place. Then, cruising on northward between the Lofoten Islands, the ship had to fold its stack and mast to fit under a bridge. The northernmost port of call was Nordkapp, about the latitude of Point Barrow, Alaska. Then back toward the south, with a call at Kristansund, home of Mort's grandmother and, it turns out, also of Paul Kaald, one of our SIG regulars! Paul was confirmed in Nylands Kirckan there. On southward they cruised to Geiranger Fjord, at the inner end of a larger fjord that departs from the sea at Ålesund. From Geiranger a tour bus took them up the mountain (19 switchbacks!), with a visit to a highcountry goat farm along the way. Next stop was Bergen, the old Hanseatic port which was the home of Edvard Grieg. The Wahlins toured Grieg's estate and listened to a concert in the small hall there. Mort bought a CD of the concert and incorporated it into the sound track of his

Conversion to Digital Records is Progressing Ahead of Plans

The Mormon Church is planning to convert almost all its genealogy microfilms to digital images. These images will then be available to genealogists who have computer access, from home and probably even from portable Internet connections while using laptop computers in libraries, courthouses or even while riding a commuter train. Writing on the Mormon church's web site, Brittany Karford of Church Magazines now reports that the project is moving much faster than originally planned.

She writes, "At the rate they were going prior to the FamilySearch Scanning technology, it was estimated that it would take 120 years to convert applicable films to digital. That same projection is now less than 30 years, perhaps sooner with planned expansions of additional scanners. The team that couldn't fathom living to see the end result will now be the team that will someday complete the digitizing process.
