PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow EGS Members,

I would like to use this month's letter to review the process regarding the upcoming election of officers that will be held May 8th at our General Membership Meeting, and to give credit to all of the current volunteers who are vital to the ongoing operation of our organization.

Regarding the election, as most of you know, we have five elected officers – President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Trustee. Each has a specific set of responsibilities as outlined in our Bylaws. A copy of our Bylaws can be viewed by clicking on the link at the bottom of the first page on our website (http://www.rootsweb.com/~wakcegs/).

Current officers are as follows – President, Norb Ziegler; Vice-President, Bob Barnes; Treasurer, Bob Osrowske; Secretary, open; Trustee, Sharron Filer.

The Eastside Genealogical Society's Bylaws call for the election of officers to be held at the May General Membership Meeting, also referred to as the Annual General Membership Meeting in the Bylaws.

According to the Bylaws, terms will be staggered with President and Secretary elected in even-numbered years, and Vice-President, Treasurer, and Trustee elected in odd numbered years. So this year, 2008, we will be electing a new President and Secretary.

It is the role of the Nominating Committee to identify and nominate qualified individuals to fill these positions. As many of you know, we have not had a nominating chairperson for some time now for want of a volunteer, so the EGS board has become the self-appointed nominating (Continued next page)

EGS Board Meeting – February 7, 2008 Summary of Minutes

Present: Norb Zeigler, Bob Barnes, Judy Meredith, Sharron Filer, Dave Abernathy, Dorothy Mehrer, Bob Osrowske.

Actions:

It was recommended and approved that we cancel our bulk mailing permit for the Bulletin and use regular first class postage to save money, now that we post it on the web and mail fewer copies.

Agreed - to have Bob O. submit membership form to Federation of Genealogical Societies.

Judy Meredith to distribute EGS mail – especially need those mailing in their dues to note on envelope "Attn: Membership."

Decision made to participate in Strawberry Festival, June 28-29 at Crossroads International Park in Bellevue.

Elections: In the absence of Nominating Chairperson, it was decided that the Board would make up the nominating committee. Bob Barnes, current Vice-President, has agreed to run for President. Judy Meredith will be appointed to fill the Vice-President vacancy. Bob Osrowske has been appointed Treasurer, replacing Pete Clarke.

Bylaws - Bob Barnes and Dave Abernathy continue to explore the different usage of Board of Directors, Executive Board, the Board, and other changes. The first priority will be clarifying the section pertaining to elections, to be published in the April Bulletin.

PROPOSED EGS BYLAW CHANGES

Over the past year members of the EGS Board have been examining possible changes to our Bylaws that would primarily address the holding of elections to fill vacancies in the offices of President or Vice-President at other than our May general membership meeting. The board recommends the following revisions to the Bylaws:

- 1. Two global changes for clarification are to eliminate the term "Executive Board" which is comprised of the five elected positions (President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary and Trustee) and is only mentioned twice in the Bylaws (with no functional connection) and is also called the "Board" as is the "Board of Directors" which is frequently in the Bylaws, thereby confusing matters. The term "Board" will be replaced by "Board of Directors."
- 2. All the election changes are exclusively in Article 5 of the Bylaws. Of the 8 Sections of Article 5 we are proposing changes to parts of four sections (new text is shown in **bold**).
- 3 Article V Section 2, Second sentence. Replace "appointed" with "**elected.**" The section discusses the President and Vice-President positions which are elected, not appointed.
 - 4. Article V, Section 3, change the last two sentences to read as follows:

"The Nominating Committee shall present a nominee for Vice-President and/or President, if the there is no sitting Vice-President, or if the sitting Vice-President has declined succession, at a General Membership meeting within sixty days of the position(s) becoming vacant. The election shall be conducted according to the provisions set forth in Article V, Sections 4 and 5."

- 5. Article V, Section 4. Change the last sentence to read:
- "At this meeting or at a general meeting where elections to fill a vacancy in the office of President or Vice-President are held, additional nominations from the floor may be made by members in good standing."
 - 6. Article V, Section 5. Change this Section to read as follows:

"Election of Officers of the Society shall take place at the May General Meeting **or**, **if to fill a vacancy in the office of President or Vice-President, may occur at any General Meeting where a quorum as described in Article IV, Section 4 is present.** Officers shall be elected by majority vote of those members present. Newly elected Officers shall assume their positions at the first Board meeting following their election." (Submitted by Bob Barnes and David Abernathy on behalf of the EGS Board of Directors.)

SUMMARY OF THE MARCH EGS MEETING

Our featured speaker at the March meeting was Lisa Oberg from the University of Washington Library System who told us how to go about unearthing genealogical gems in the University Library. This can be a real challenge because, as Lisa pointed out, the University Library System is not a genealogy library per se, and it does not even have a genealogical section. It does, however, house over 7 million books, many special collections, manuscripts, collections of government documents, historical photographs, maps and atlases, journals, magazines, microfilm and newspapers. While the majority of these materials are located on the main UW campus in the Suzzallo and Allen Libraries, they are distributed between over twenty different libraries, branch libraries and storage facilities situated from Tacoma to Friday Harbor. The Genealogist's Guide to the Suzzallo Library to be found in the Suzzallo Library main floor reference section can be a good starting point if it is your first visit.

Lisa pointed out that successful genealogical research at the UW libraries starts with a thorough search of the library's online catalog(s) prior to physically going to the library. Moreover, as Lisa pointed out, because each of these library facilities has its own operating hours, and often may have reduced hours between academic quarters, once one has located items of interest in the catalog the next step is to find out where in the system that they are, their current availability, and what the operating hours are of the specific library where they are located.



The genealogy material to be found is most likely of a historical event nature rather than specific to individuals. But there are exceptions. If you have an ancestor who graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree from the UW prior to about 1940 then you will likely be able to find a copy of their senior thesis which was then a requirement for receiving such a degree. If you have an ancestor who was an inventor you may find information about them and their invention in the comprehensive patent files. Similarly, if one's ancestors were early residents of the northwest, newspaper articles may provide specific information as to their life and times. The United States Serial Set is also a potential resource for extensive personal information, as are the many biographical dictionaries in the library's collection.

And then there are the specialized databases that may be accessed from any of the University's libraries. Of particular genealogical interest are the America History & Life database for identifying journal articles in American and Canadian History and the American Periodical Series Online, a full-text data base of 18th-20th century magazines. And there are many more.

Lisa also spoke briefly about the University's Genealogy and Family History certificate program, which is offered by UW Extension. It is a year's course of study starting with Genealogy and Family History in the first quarter, followed by a quarter of Research Sources and Strategies and culminating in a Research Seminar in Genealogy and Family History where the participant completes a 20 page family history project. Oh, and if one needs additional incentive, an enrollee in this program is also considered a UW student and has on-line access to many of the databases that can only be accessed otherwise from the library itself.

RESEARCH SUCCESS THANKS TO SARAH

After Sarah Fleming's excellent presentation on newspaper research at the last Computer SIG group meeting I decided to give it a try on one of my more frustrating genealogical challenges. One set of my maternal gggrandparents had been raised in the Philadelphia area. We have a pair of needlepoint framed silhouettes of the couple dated 1827 which was assumed to be their marriage date, as they both were born in 1800. One complicating factor was that the couple were first cousins and the Quaker Church, which forbade such marriages, had been the dominant faith in their family though a number of the family had been ordered out of the Quaker Order for a variety of transgressions. I had found the couple's obituaries in the *Philadelphia Public Ledger* for 1844 and 1848 but I had found no mention of their marriage in this newspaper or in any of the early Pennsylvania marriage records that I had consulted. The couple had six children, three of whom survived to adulthood, the oldest of these three being born in 1831, my great grandmother was the youngest, born in 1841. I have not yet found any information on the three who died young, even their names are unknown to me. Thus, while a marriage date between 1820 and 1830 is almost a certainty, the exact date has been elusive.

Enter Sarah's presentation and the following article that appeared in the January 5, 1829, Aurora and Pennsylvania Gazette:

MARRIED

On the 1st inst. By Elder Frederick Plummer, Mr. NATHAN SUPLEE to Miss HANNAH SUPLEE, all of Delaware County.



INDEXES TO NARA'S LATEST GERMANS/ITALIANS/RUSSIANS DATA

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) recently announced that 5.2 million records of some passengers who arrived during the last half of the 19th century at the ports of Baltimore, Boston, New Orleans, New York, and Philadelphia have now been placed online for the first time. These records include data on Germans, Italians, and Russians. The records can be accessed through NARA's online Access to Archival Databases (AAD). The records include the name of the ship, the port, and the date. As several commenters pointed out after the announcement was published, the process of finding all that information is not intuitive, especially the use of the Manifest File. Now Steve Morse of "One-Step Genealogy" fame has created a trio of One-Step tools to simplify the use of the NARA databases.



In describing the new tools, Steve Morse wrote, "From the results that I present, it's very obvious how to get the ship details. Rather than displaying a number corresponding to the manifest ID as they do, I instead display a link that says "get ship." I also fixed up some other rough spots that appear on their site, such as the CLEAR button coming to the left of the SEARCH button (what in the world were they thinking?)." The tools are at the bottom of the OTHER PORTS section of Steve Morse's "One-Step Portal for On-Line Genealogy" at http://stevemorse.org.
