PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow EGS Members,

Each EGS board member is expected to prepare an annual report summarizing their work over the past year. I have elected to use the following approach to reflect my view of where we are as an organization at this point in time.

Key Accomplishments as an Organization:

(Projects led by individual members)

- Electronic distribution of newsletter.
 Over half our membership is now receiving the newsletter electronically. This has resulted in more timely and efficient delivery of the newsletter, and has also resulted in significant, on-going cost savings (see next item). This project has been a resounding success.
- As a result of the electronic distribution of our newsletter, we have reduced printing and postage costs 33%, and will save a projected \$1375 per year on an ongoing basis, and potentially more as additional members sign up for this option. This clearly represents significant savings to the organization.

• Initiated *Volunteer Spotlight* column.

Our organization is fueled by volunteer power. This periodic newsletter column will give recognition to our volunteers, especially those that have been actively involved over many years.

• Started newsletter Query column.

Now every member can submit a query to the newsletter for a response from other members.

Updated the bylaws.

New bylaws give more formal recognition to our SIG organizations and also

facilitates the board voting process.

- SIG representative added to EGS board.
 EGS has 8 active special interest groups (SIGs). This recognizes their importance to the organization.
- Re-Started Irish SIG.
 A reflection of the growing interest in specialized services.
- tion. The Supply Table function. The Supply Table function has been fine tuned to re-flect the fact that our members are not buying books the way they have in the past, and are increasingly using the inter net for research rather than books. Going forward, a limited selection of books will be sold in conjunction with monthly programs and special events.
- Sponsored website redesign task force.
 This is just get ting started.
 A plan has been developed to improve our website.
 Look for periodic articles in the newsletter for more in formation.
- Improved Surname file. The surname file is a
 list of surnames being researched by the
 membership, and also contains additional
 related information. This information has
 been reorganized and is available for
 viewing at our monthly meetings.
 Eventually, we expect to have this information available on our website.

SUMMARY OF EGS MAY GENERAL MEETING

May 10, 2007 General Meeting

Wow! We were right--everyone has interesting ancestors!

Those sharing stories of their dearly departed were: Nancy Spaeth, Betty Bennett, Stephanie Millican, Jack Newman, Maxine Klink, Tom Harman, Jack Julich, Jim Flexer, John Wise, Mickey Main, and Bernie Christensen.

We heard about a grandmother who defended her homestead by shooting several Indians, aided by a blind man who reloaded her gun for her. This woman's husband, by the way, was a friend of Kit Carson.

We learned about other ancestors tortured and killed by the British during the Revolutionary War.

We heard about another member's ancestor who was the president of a Chicago suburb—Harlem Village—which became Forest Park. We got to see his picture, too.

One member told of family conflicts during the Civil War, the result of one part of the family being on the Union side and the other on the Confederate side.

Another member is related to two women who were convicted of being witches and hanged in Salem, MA in 1692. He told us there is a statue of one marking the event in Salem today.

One interesting ancestor was among the first to settle western Iowa. This man developed a new variety of peach and started a nursery business and sold cedar trees all over the country.

Another member's family includes both Revolutionary War patriots and loyalists. One family boasts three generations of teachers.

Another told of an exciting break through when family records led back to Montreal.

We heard how one member has introduced his grandson to genealogy, tracing the family back to Robert Bruce of Scotland, with a fairly high degree of certainty, through an illegitimate daughter of Robert Bruce. To illustrate this, he brought along some wonderful charts.

Another member, with local ties, has at least one local street and a mountain pass named for her ancestors.

ANNUAL LIBRARY REPORT TO EGS BOARD

We had 17 Research Volunteers who contributed more than 300 hours of research assistance time at the Bellevue Regional Library. During this year we served 85 researchers that signed in as well as answering several letter and e-mail requests. The volunteers are: Judy Meredith, Bob Barnes, Art and Sharon Starbo, Pam Hillman, Barbara Guyll, Winnie Sihon, Jack Newman, Sharon Pakkala, Melissa Clausen, Ann Passe, Laura and John Wise, Ellie Dickson, and Dorothy Mehrer. Barbara Zanzig and Frankie

Botticelli assisted part of the year. We were able to preserve our room and reference shelves on the 2nd floor and added a portable computer to our workroom for the use of research assistants and their researchers. November 11th the library provided flyers to distribute at the FHL fair in Bellevue entitled "Use Your King County Library" and written by Ms.

Sihon.

The Book Selection committee has functioned with about 10 members and added Marty Gale to our group at the recent meeting. Selections were late this year as the group was unable to meet as many times as other years, few requests came in, and several expensive volumes that were intended to be purchased were delayed in publication. Sarah Fleming and Margery Perdue have completed their review of the shelves for books that needed to be located, discarded, or repaired. A new list of the EGS collection is now available in the research assistance file and at the BRL Reference desk.

USE YOUR KING COUNTY LIBRARY

Eastside Genealogy has contributed time and money to help build the Genealogy Reference Collection at Bellevue Regional Library. Our annual budget puts at least \$1000 into this resource. You can locate all the genealogy materials by using your KCLS library card/pin number to access the library catalog at www.kcls.org.

1. Reference books, found on the 2nd floor,

can only be used in the library. If you wish to use materials at another library, they can be transferred to your local library reference desk for limited in house use. Circulating books can be located and ordered for check out.

- 2. Click on Databases or Web Links and select Genealogy for online resources. <u>Ancestry Library Edition</u> is accessible only in KCLS libraries. There are many other online resources to choose including Heritage Quest, census records, PERSI indexes, Castle Garden and Ellis Island immigration stations, and the <u>Palmer List of Merchant Vessels</u>. Take a look!
- 3. Newspapers, magazines, and society newsletters are either in the stacks or in the Genealogy Vertical Files at Bellevue Regional Library.
- 4. Inter-Library Loans of genealogy books, family histories, and newspaper microfilms can be arranged through the librarians.
- 5. Bellevue Regional Library has five microfilm reader/printers plus local newspapers and the Washington State Death Index on microfilm.
- 6. Research Assistance is provided at Bellevue Regional Library on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 PM and Wednesday afternoons from 1:00 to 3:00 PM by members of EGS in room 6. [Submitted by EGS Library Chair, Winnie Sihon]

MICROSOFT WINDOWS VISTA

I know that this has nothing to do with our family history, but most of us are using a computer. There are a lot of us older people that do not have access to information about computers.



I have been using a computer since 1978. This was on the job while I was still working. We were preparing engineering drawings using what is called CAD/CAM software and hardware. Before retirement I started

using a PC at work (there is that 4 letter word again) and then we bought one for use at home. I have been using one ever since.

At this time we have 3 desktops, 2 laptops and 2 pockets PC's. We are networked together sharing 2 printers and a cable connection to the internet. We also have 3 scanners and a bunch of USB hard drives and thumb drives.

Now some information about the new Microsoft Windows Vista that is available for upgrade

or on a new machine.

Vista is a great Operating System, but in my book, there is nothing that I MUST have. If one is in the need for a new machine, then by all means do get a Vista machine, but make sure that you get one with at least Home Premium on it. The lower line will not have the capabilities of the Aero and 3-d Flip or the horse power. For those who are going to "Upgrade" to Vista, go to the following website and download the Windows Vista Upgrade Advisor. The adviser will help you to determine if your Windows XP-based PC can run Windows Vista. You can also use the Upgrade Advisor to determine if your Windows Vista based PC is ready for an upgrade to a more powerful edition of Windows Vista.

This tool will scan your computer and create an easy-to-understand report of all known system, device, and program compatibility issues, and recommend ways to resolve them. Upgrade Advisor can also help you to choose the edition of Windows Vista that best fits the way you want to use your computer.

Once one has run the above tool, one will need to check the report and be prepared to get all new versions of one's AntiVirus, Spam Blockers, and any other utility that is OS dependent. That said, only a few of the software companies have released Vista approved versions. There are a lot of issues with older printers and scanners. At this time the "Palm Pilot" interface is not there, but several of the "Pocket PC's" are working.

For Microsoft's own "Vista Application Compatibility List" for both "Certified for" or "Works with" Vista application go to sup-port.microsoft.com/kb/933305. This list is being updated daily as new items are approved.

The following requirements are from Microsoft, but, you will need a much larger hard drive to install your programs and save your data. I would shoot for at least a 100 GIG drive.

"Upgrade Advisor", go to windows/products/windowsvista/buyorupgrade/upgradeadvisor.mspx, download and run the advisor. Be sure to print out the report(s) from the advisor, as you will need it to figure out what programs and/or hard drives will need to be replaced or upgraded. I will continue this next month.

- Czech Immigration Passenger Lists, Vol 2, written and published by Leo Baca in 1985, 190 pp. Information on mostly Czech immigrants arriving at the ports of Galveston 1896-1906 and New Orleans 1879-1899. R929.3089 BAC V.2
- Later Scots-Irish Links 1725-1825 by David Dobson, two volumes, Genealogical Publishing Co. 2005, 204 pp. The goal of Scots-Irish Links is to help persons of Scotch-Irish descent make the linkage first to Ulster and then back to Scotland. University students predominate among the persons listed, followed by apprentices, ministers, merchants, weavers, teachers, or persons in flight. While most of the students are described merely by name, university, and date of attendance, in a number of cases the author is able to provide information on the individual's spouse, children, parents, local origins, landholding, and, of course, the source of the information. This book amends the information in other Scots-Irish books by author Dobson previously added to the library's collection. R929-308991 DOB.

NARA PROPOSES FEE INCREASES

Two rules published in the Federal Register on Monday, 26 February 2007, (Volume 72, Number 37, wais.access.gpo.gov and also: www.access.gpo.gov/su_docs/fedreg/a070226c.html) relate to fees for reproductions of records at the U.S. National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). The proposed rules cover reproduction of Federal records created by other agencies that are in the National Archives of the United States, donated historical materials, Presidential records, Nixon Presidential historical materials and records filed with the Office of the Federal Register. This proposal affects the public and Federal agencies.

A few of the proposed increases are: (Type of record, Order form#, Proposed Fee)

- Passenger Arrival Lists, NATF Form 81, \$25
- Federal Census Requests, NATF Form 82, \$25
- Eastern Cherokee Applications to the Court of Claims, NATF Form 83, \$25
- Land Entry Records, NATF Form 84, \$40
- Full Pension File More Than 75 Years Old (Civil War Period), NATF Form 83, \$125 (A 338% increase from the present fee of \$37)
- Pension Documents Packet (Selected Records) NATF Form 84, \$25
- Bounty Land Warrant Application Files, NATF Form 85, \$25
- Military Service Files More Than 75 Years Old, NATF Form 86, \$25

book is available at the Supply Table in limited quantities.


