To Start Up Cement Plant

Word has been received from Joseph M. Snow, of Olympia, state highway commissioner, that for the new state road through Stevens county the south route has been selected, and that he will be here this month to make a trip over the line. This south route crosses the range near the Little Pend d'Oreille, while the other route surveyed, the north route, followed the south fork of Mill creek. J. B. Thomas made both surveys, and while he made no recommendations, he now says that the south route will probably prove the better and pass through a more settled section.

Every citizen of the United States who is not known to the local customs agents, must produce the sum of \$25, or he is forbidden the privilege of crossing over the line into British Columbia territory. It appears that this is a new ruling only recently put into effect, and it is being enforced with a vengeance by the Canadian inspector stationed at Paterson on the Red Mountain Railway. --Northport Republican.

The foreman of the Plantations company at Meyers Falls has been notified to stop the 25 to 30 wood cutters employed in cutting cordwood on its property. About 2000 cords are now cut ready for shipment, but the freight rate to Spokane is \$1.75, which is prohibitive so far as shipping is concerned.

OBJECTS TO ECKERSON

Lawyer Says He Is Not El[i]gible to Act on Council.
Eckerson Tenders His Resignation

Attorney Sherlock created a sensation at the meeting of the city council on Tuesday night, when, after the vote on the second reading of the ordinance granting the Idaho & Washington Northern Railroad a franchise over certain streets was finished, he rose and asked permission to address the council.

He said he would object . . . on the ground that one of the parties voting . . . was not a resident of Newport, but resided outside the state.

The remark brought Councilman Eckerson to his feet. He said . . . the remark was directed at him, . . . He claimed that he was at Spirit Lake temporarily only, that he maintained a room in his house in this city. . . and that he occupied it whenever in this city. While it was true that his wife was living with him at Spirit Lake, they still claimed [Newport] as their home. . . .

Mr. Sherlock . . . thought that Mr. Eckerson should . . . resign from the [Newport City Council] position. He claimed Spirit Lake was dominated by the railroad company, . . .

This statement brought Mr. J. C. H. Reynolds, of the Idaho & Washington Northern, into the game. He resented the statement of Mr. Sherlock, . . . and stated that the company had nothing whatever to do with the town, but that the town site was owned by Mr. F. A. Blackwell.

. . . [Mr. Eckerson] tendered his resignation, and asked the mayor to have a vote taken on its acceptance.

. . . Councilman Hynes, the first member, voted aye, as did McInnis, who followed on the roll call. . . . Councilman Caldwell . . . stated he wished to have a little more information on the subject before voting on it, and he suggested that the matter be deferred until the next meeting. Councilman Bennett stated that Mr. Eckerson had consulted with him . . . Councilmen Hynes and McInnis withdrew their votes to accept the resignation, and the matter was carried over

Death of Mrs. J. R. Patterson

Early Saturday morning, May 2, at her home, a few miles north of Newport, occurred the death of Mrs. Alice Eliza Cooley Patterson, leaving her husband, one daughter, Bertha, and a son, Arthur Floyd, to mourn her passing away.

From there she went to nearly all the western states, settling on a homestead in the vicinity of Newport in 1902. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday at M. E. church in Newport, Rev. Morton officiating. Interment in I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Attempted Murder at Elk

Mrs. North, landlady at he Montgomery hotel at Elk, was probably fatally shot on last Friday night, as she was passing from one portion of the hotel building to another. The bullet entered her temple. She was taken to Spokane and placed in a hospital, but her life is despaired of.

No trace of the would-be murderer has been found, although suspicion points strongly to one party.

The body was discovered immediately after the shot was fired, and a thorough search made for the party who fired the shot, but all of the persons about the premises could give a good account of their whereabouts at the time of the firing of the shot.

The assassin was evidently located on the roof of a building in the rear of the hotel, the direction the bulletin took after entering the head indicates as much.

Mr. Montgomery, the owner of the hotel, is ill in a hospital in Minneapolis.

Mrs. North has resided in Camden and Elk for the past five or six years. She has been living apart from her husband for about ten years, and his whereabouts has been unknown to the family for several years, so that no suspicion attaches to him. She is the mother of one son and a daughter. The son, who is known as "Mickey," is well known in Newport, where he has worked at various times. He was in this city last Thursday. The daughter, Esther, is about 15 years old, and has been residing with her mother at Elk.

In case Mrs. North dies it is reported a suspect will be arrested.

[The 1910 Federal Census lists an Oregon-born Esther North, age 17, residing at the House of the Good Shepard in the 5th Ward of Spokane, Washington.]



GENERAL EVAN MILES, STEVENS COUNTY PIONEER

The following was transcribed from an article in *The Newport Minor*, Thursday, May 28, 1908.

Was Stevens County Pioneer

Gen. Evan Miles, retired, of Colville, died at the Presidio in San Francisco on Sunday, aged 70 years.

Gen. Miles was one of the best known military men in the west. He served through the civil war under Gen. Meade, and participated in the Cuban campaign during the war with Spain. At the battle of El Caney he received the surrender of the Spanish. During the campaign he contracted the Cuban fever, from which he never really recovered.

During the early '70 he was stationed in Arizona, and saw much fighting against the Apaches and other Indian tribes in that section. In 1872 he marched with his entire command from Arizona overland to Fort Colville, one of the longest and hardest marches ever taken by a detachment of American troops.

He was in command at the Presidio when the Spanish war broke out, and immediately went to the front as commander of the First United States infantry.

He was married in 1874 to a daughter of Jacob Stitzel, of Colville, who survives him.
