MILLIONS OF HISTORIC SOUTHERN RECORDS NOW ON THE WEB

In the past 18 months, FamilySearch has been diligently publishing digital images and indexes from Southern states. It is part of a worldwide initiative to provide fast, economical access to genealogical records. Fueled by over 100,000 online volunteers, FamilySearch is digitizing and indexing historical records and publishing them online. Viewers can search the free collection on the Record Search pilot at FamilySearch.org (click Search Records, and then click Record Search pilot).

FamilySearch has also published free indexes to the 1850, 1860, 1870, 1880, 1900, and 1920 (partial) U.S Censuses—all important resources for Southern states research.

During both pre and post Civil War eras, there was general migration from the eastern seaboard, down through the Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama, and on into Texas. "The publication of these records will begin to open up and answer many questions about family members that migrated and were never heard from again," Rencher added.

With just a few clicks, visitors can now search millions of records online for that elusive ancestor. Or pore through digital images of historic documents that before this time were inconvenient or impossible for many to access because the original documents were located in an archive somewhere in the South.

RESEARCHING ANCESTORS IN THE DIRECT TAX OF 1798

To fund a military buildup for a possible war with France, Congress enacted a \$2 million direct tax in July 1798. Each of the country's 16 states had to come up with its share of the \$2 million. A state's quota was based on population, with slaves counting as three-fifths of a person. State officials created their own forms and valued property, enumerated slaves and collected the taxes.

Houses valued at more than \$100 were taxed on the value. Since many of these homes had expensive glass windows, this is also called the "glass tax." Slaveowners were taxed 50 cents for each able-bodied slave age 12 to 50. All other real property, which included houses valued at \$100 or less, was taxed at a fixed percentage of the value.

The controversial tax was repealed in 1799. Resulting records include valuations, enumerations and tax collection lists. Because the law allowed responsibility for the tax to be transferred to other governmental departments, with no directive to forward records to Washington, many of these records have been lost. Known 1798 direct tax lists and their physical locations are listed on the National Archives Web site. Unfortunately, the records' varied locations means you won't find a comprehensive online database for all types of direct tax records from all states.

FROM A SINGLE ANCESTRAL GROUP, DNA STUDY CONFIRMS

For two decades, researchers have been using a growing volume of genetic data to debate whether ancestors of Native Americans emigrated to the New World in one wave or successive waves, or from one ancestral Asian population or a number of different populations.

Now, after painstakingly comparing DNA samples from people in dozens of modern-day Native American and Eurasian groups, an international team of scientists thinks it can put the matter to rest: Virtually without exception the new evidence supports the single ancestral population theory.

"Our work provides strong evidence that, in general, Native Americans are more closely related to each other than to any other existing Asian populations, except those that live at the very edge of the Bering Strait," said Kari Britt Schroeder, a lecturer at the University of California, Davis, and the first author on the paper describing the study.

"While earlier studies have already supported this conclusion, what's different about our work is that it provides the first solid data that simply cannot be reconciled with multiple ancestral populations," said Schroeder, who was a Ph.D. student in anthropology at the university when she did the research.

ROME, GEORGIA CEMETERY BURIAL DATA NOW ONLINE

Thanks to a new burial data program on the city of Rome's web site, genealogy researchers and loved ones may have an easier time locating their ancestors buried in Rome's public cemeteries. The service can assist those looking for the plots of ancestors, family or friends buried in city-owned cemeteries — Eastview, Oakland and Myrtle Hill.

The information only covers burial records, the cemetery lot number and plot location number. The site can also generate clickable maps of the cemeteries that allow the user to navigate and find the exact placement of the plot.

Many of the birth dates for older interments may read 01/01, an indication that the birth date is unknown. As records are updated, or in some cases found, they will update the birth date information, according to city officials.
